

SCANDAL ARISES

Out of Admiral Dewey's Transfer of His House.

Gossips Say It is to Escape a Breach of Promise Sult...The Hero of Manila Weeps.

Washington, Nov. Nov. 22. - John R. McLean is here and doing what he ean to quiet the terrific storm of gossip created by Dewey in transferring his "honor house" to his wife. Although McLean has telephoned some of the principal newspaper offices and has otherwise done his best, he has not yet turned the tide of the severe and

yet turned the tide of the severe and even brutal popular criticism.

The statement given out that the house has been transferred to Dewey's son, and that such was the intention from the first, is being picked to pieces with ferocious zest. The son is a business man and subject to business vicissitudes, they say, and therefore the precious house is liable any time young Dewey fails to be seized to satisfy a judgment. To hold the title secure, it is alleged, nothing could be safer than to leave it in the hands of a retired naval officer with a salary a retired naval officer with a salary and allowances amounting to \$17,000 a

The statement is freely made that Dewey was securing the property against a breach of promise suit. The name of Mrs. Dora Kent, a pretty widow in the Government service, is freely mentioned in this connection. She says she doesn't even know Dewey. It is also freely hinted that ey. It is also freely hinted that friends of the McKinley, administra-tion have originated the scandal so as to kill Dewey as a possible presidential

DEWEY SHEDS TEARS.

Admiral Dewey has made a statement in which he says: "When I made over my house to my wife, I thought I was doing the most gracious act an American gentleman could do. I thought people had given me, the house to dispose of as I chose. It seems I was mistaken. I would never have sold, nor disposed of it in any manner whatsever outside of my family, but I did believe I had a right to give it to my wife or son. Mrs. Dewey understood better than I did the feelings of the people and at first declined to permit the house to be transferred to her. General Joubert's plan, apparently, is a daring attempt to defeat the British relieving column from Durban, in detail, while still attempting the reduction of Ladysmith. A serious attack on Mooi River Camp is hourly expected with the destroying of the bridge at Weston. Should this be accomplished, the Boers would be free to turn their attention to Estcourt, while, if it failed, the enemy would retire again on Weenenen and join the investing forces around Ladysmith.

Little is known regarding the food supplies of the garrisons thus isosupplies of the garrisons thus iso-lated. It is believed that Estcourt is well provided, but there is less confi-dence in the case of Mooi River.

NATAL'S CAPITAL. THE CAMP AT MOO

Boer Forces. Sharp Artillery Duel-The Enemy Have the British Forces Insolated

at Different Points. durban, Nov. 23.—The Boers opened fire with artillery on the Mooi River camp, south of Estcourt, from the north, but without casualties to the British. The British fired several shells which care the several severa shells, which are believed to have causshells, which are believed to have caused havoc among the Boers, the latter taking advantage of the heavy rain and retiring. The Boer shells were apparently aimed at the bridge. It was a surprise attack, but had been fully guarded against. The British had three wounded.

The engagement found the British almost entirely on the defensive. A says the Boers' second shell fell with-in a few yards of a detachment of British infantry; that the shells did little or no damage, and that firing continued for about half an hour, at continued for about half an hour, at intervals of from three to four minutes According to this account the British troops hurried with the utmost promptitude and advanced under cover wherever possible. The British artillery was in position behind the hotel where Gen. Barton and his staff were being accommodated. Maj. Thornycroft's mounted infantry moved to cover on ridge of the enemy's left flank. The Devonshire Regiment and the Royal ridge of the enemy's left flank. The Devonshire Regiment and the Royal Welsh Fusiliers occupied the trenches. There was but little fire, the correspondent says, but the enemy possessed at least one howitzer, with a range of five miles, besides several sixpounders.

MOOI CAMP SURROUNDED.

MOOI CAMP SURROUNDED.

The Morning Post's correspondent at Pietermaritzburg, telegraphing Tuesday evening, says:—"The Boers are now all around Mooi River station.

The Daily News has the following from Pietermaritzburg, under date of Wednesday: — "Your correspondent managed to escape from the Mooi River district before the arrival of 6,000 Boers, who are looting the farmsteads in all directions. The Natal Boers, encouraged by the success of the Transvaalers, join in the looting. The main body of the Boers made a rapid march from Ululdi, south-west of Estcourt, to a point near Fort Nottingham, south of the railway, in a single day. They are within 40 miles single day. They are within 40 miles of Pietermaritzburg at the farthest,
