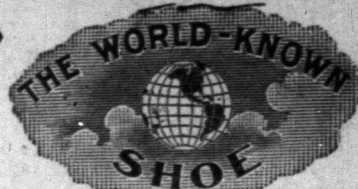

THE PLANET FUND

For the Relief of the Hull Fire Sufferers

Is Growing Slowly—Aid for the Distressed Cannot be too Generously Given.

If we are to take the Biblical statement that the Lord loveth a cheerful giver literally his friends in Chatham do not appear to be very numerous. In response to a request from Ottawa The Planet has opened a relief fund for the sufferers, but the subscriptions are not coming in half as fast as the urgency of the case requires, or as the wealth of the citizens justifies. However, several subscriptions have come to hand, with pleasing promptness, and more will doubtless follow. These homeless people will require aid yet for weeks to come so that no contribution, however modest, will prove amiss.

FIRE NOTES
The Lord Mayor of London has opened a Mansion House fund for the aid of the sufferers.

Mayor Maybury, of Detroit, wired from New York to his deputy to tender Ottawa sympathy and offer aid.

The more the losses from the fire are carefully gone into the more apparent it is that they will total up about \$15,000,000, as at first estimated in the correspondence. The loss of lumber alone is now at \$25,000,000, or between \$3,000,000 and \$4,000,000.

The Globe's fund is over \$3,000, and the Mail's over \$1,000. Altogether, including the city grant, Toronto has raised over \$40,000 since Friday morning.

The mayor of Bradford has opened a subscription and to-night the city council there will pass a handsome contribution.

Mayor Van Wyck, of New York, has issued an appeal for aid to the fire sufferers. He urges the citizens of the American metropolis to contribute with their usual generosity.

Buffalo forwarded \$1,000 for the relief fund on Saturday.

Hamilton has given \$2,000, besides \$1,000 more in private subscriptions. The town council of Napanee voted \$100 on Saturday.

Mayor Watson, of Sarnia, telegraphed \$100 on Saturday.

Guelph council voted \$300, which the citizens have augmented by \$300 or \$400 more.

Dr. Seward Webb, the American railway magnate now in Paris, cabled Ottawa \$500. James Ross, of Montreal, sent \$2,000.

Toronto held a special meeting of the city council and voted the Hull fire sufferers \$25,000. There was a great row over the grant, however. Some of the wealthiest aldermen in the council only wanted to give \$15,000, when someone remarked, "there's your rich men for you." That started the racket, which reached its height when the mayor called for the police. Then the council adjourned.

At a special meeting in London, the council voted \$1,000.
