INDIAN ATHLETES.

Their Favorite Games Were Rowling, Bal Running, Wrestling, &c.

The American Indians were great bowlers. Alleys of greater length than any in use to-day were built in the open fields. Balls hewn out of Formula of Zina Pitcher. M. D. stone were rolled by genuine Indian muscle. In fact, there is scarcely a popular kind of game played in this country to-day but that its counterpart can be found in the age of the red man. They were gamblers, too, ever Strange to say, the average school history has abounded in a description of the Indian in nearly every point except the details of the games.

Relics of the Indian bowling alley are rare except in a few sections of this country, thus showing that the game was not a universal one, and of all the games which the Indian played bowling is undoubtedly the most remote. The Western Reserve of Ohio was one of the centers for the Indian bowlers. In several parts of Ashtabula county some of the older residests have these relica preserved. which they have picked up themselves in their early farming, usually in the open field.

The balls used, instead of being large wooden ones, like those in use to-day, were made of light-colored stone, and range in size from an ordinary league ball down to the com-mon small toy rubber ball. The al-leys were built of wood carved out make a reasonably smooth surface. The game was more to see how far could roll rather than accuracy in striking the ten pins at the opposite ad of the alley. The judges threw the ball in the air, and simmediately hundreds of Indians started after it. One finally succeeded in catching it between the large ends of the "to "tennis rackets," and threw it "home," or between two es, the limit of one side or the oth-This would count one point toward the game, and the side getting 100

points first won. Often in the terrible struggle for the ball difficulties would arise between two slightly injured contestants and the game would stop until they settled the dispute. The women also played ball. When the nen were tired they would announce a game be ween the women, and prizes would be awarded to their winning

WHAT THE LAW DECIDED

To make a person "learned in the law" within the meaning of a consti-tutional provision prescribing such learning as necessary to make one eligible to be judge, it is held, in Jamieson vs. Wiggin (S. D.), 46 L. R. A. 317, that he must be admitted to practice, or entitled to be zamitted, as an attorney at law in the State. as an attorney at law in the State.

The burden of providing justification or legal excuse for killing another with a deadly weapon is held, in Tucwith a deadly weapon is held, in Tucker vs. State ex rel. Johnson (Md), 46 L. R. A. 181, to be on the defendant in an action by the relatives of the deceased for causing his death, where the killing was done with a deadly weapon while the victim was attacking a third newson. ing a third person.

For an injury caused by a defective highway combined with the negligence of a third person it is held, in Bartram vs. Sharon (Conn.), 46 L. R. A. 144, that no recovery can be had under a statute giving a right of action for a penalty in case of injuries caused by a defective highway. The court re-fuses to hold that the defect in the highway causes the injury when the culpable negligence of a third person is the proximate cause of the injury.

A statute making a railroad company liable to an employe injured by the negligent act of a fellow-servant is upheld in Tullis vs. Lake Erie & Western Railroad company, advance sheets U. S. p. 136, against the contention that it denies such corpora-tions the equal protection of the laws. The court holds that the peculiar hazards in the operation of a railroad justify the separate classification of such

Persons staying at a hotel under a contract for a special rate which is given to all who stay longer than a week are held, in Meacham vs. Galloway (Tenn.), 46 L. R. A. 319, not to pe guests for whose property the land-lord is an insurer, but to be boarders for the loss of whose property he is

liable only in case of negligence. Space covered by the high sea upon the border of a State, to the extent of three miles from the short, is held, in Humboldt Lumber Manufacturers' association vs. Christopherson (C. C. App. 9th C.), 46 L. R. A. 264, to be within the operation of a State statute creating a liability for wrongfully causing the death of another. this case is a complete review of the authorities on the question of the jurisdiction over the sea.

To prepare the feast required 75 chief cooks, 13,000 waiters, scullions, cellarmen and helpers. 80,000 plates, 42,000 glasses, knives, torks and spoons in proportion, 40,000 rolls and fish, meat and fowl by the ton. The banquet was, part of the centenary relebration of the events of 1780.

Setting Tires,

The old way of putting a tire on a wheel was to shrink it on. The tire was made just a trifle smaller than the wheel, and then heated, with the result of expanding it slightly. When thus heated it was crowded down over the rim of the wheel, and then cooled with water; to keep it from burning ing, it was shrunk on, to bind the wheel tightly. The modern way of putting a tire on a wheel is with a hy-

draulic tire-setting press. By this method the tire is made just a trifle larger than the wheel, so that it will go over the rim freely. The bed of this press, upon which the wheel lies horizontally, with an opening at the centre for the hub, is composed of eighteen sections, radiating from the centre and in shape like the spaces between the spokes of a wheel. The outer end of each section is turned upward, the turned-up ends making a continuous flange, or collar, all around the bed of the press. Each one of the sections has under it a hy-draulic cylinder, and the sections are all arranged to work to a common cen-tre. In use the wheel is laid on the press, with the cold tire around it, within that turned-up collar, or flange, around the edge. When the press is set in operation the collar or flange is irresistibly contracted. When it comes in contact with the fire around the wheel it does not bring up against it, but keeps on contracting just the same, now contracting the tire as well, and setting it upon the wheel, the pressure being continued, until the wheel itself has been brought to the requisite degree of dishing.
