GRAND RAPIDS WITHDRAWS.

Grand Rapids, June 25.—The quarrel between the managements of the Saginaw and Grand Rapids teams relative to the distribution of the gate receipts of the game at Saginaw on Sunday, June 17, caused the break-up of the Grand Rapids team here to-day, the local management refusing to play the game, although the Saginaw team was on hand. Eddy refused to make good the Grand Rapids share of the receipts. Grand Rapids will now make a break for the Interstate League, the management of the Wheeling team having promised to come here if free grounds can be secured. There is talk of transferring the local team to Bay City or Flint, but the Stars have already left the city, and the team cannot be gotten together again. Saginaw will play its dates at home, and will go to Hamilton on Dominion Day, July 1st, ending the season at Saginaw on July 4, with Chatham. Boyie, of the Grand Rapids team will probably have a trial at second with the Detroit.

CHATHAM WHITEWASHED.

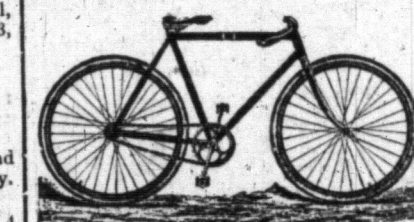
Canadian Liberal Member of Parliament Advocates Annexation of Canada

To the United States in an Address at Marquette, Michigan.

Marquette, Mich., June 23.—Twelve societies and about 1,000 marchers took part in the big parade here yesterday, which was one of the features of the quarter centennial celebration of the Societe de St. Jean Baptiste de Marquette, the oldest French-Canadian society in the northwest. Three other societies were represented by delegations. Every society in the upper peninsula except one was represented. Duluth and St. Paul in Minnesota were represented. The parade was a record breaker. The principal address was delivered by the Hon. D. Monet, Liberal member of the Canadian parliament. This was given in French and at times elicited wild applause. Mr. Monet came out in favor of the annexation of Canada to the United States. The chief of the minor addresses was delivered by Hon. Joseph Primeau, of Marquette, one of the founders and first president of the society. A reception and ball concluded the program.
