Three children were found in the Police Court, but as their parents were present in the court room the services of the officer were not required. Two applications for children have been received.

Notes of thanks were passed to the Ridgeway public school, Slabtown public school, School Section No. 11, Harwich, Victoria avenue Methodist Sunday school, Park street Methodist Sunday school, First Presbyterian Sunday school and Christ Church for handsome donations.

The widow of the late Chief of Police Young was made an honorary member of the Society.

The executive officer of the Society, Dr. R. V. Bray, was appointed to address the meeting of the East Kent Teachers Association on May 22nd in behalf of the Society.

It was decided to hold their quarterly meeting on May 27th, when it is expected that J. J. Kelso, of Toronto, will give an address. Further particulars will be received from Mr. Kelso later.

Premiers at the Coronation

The State Premiers of Australia will not be as numerous as represented at the coronation as was at first supposed, says The London Chronicle. They resent the invitation to the coronation, and the uncertainty of the status to be accorded them has also been a hesitating factor. Mr. Peacock, the Premier of Victoria, has definitely decided not to make the trip, but to send as the representative of the State the Hon. William McCulloch, the Minister of Defence. Mr. McCulloch is the Nestor of the Victorian Ministry, and was Chairman of the Cabinet Committee that arranged all the functions connected with the opening of the first Commonwealth Parliament in Melbourne last May by the Prince of Wales. His Knighthood on that occasion was regarded as a certainty, but somehow he was overlooked. The Queensland Premier, Mr. Philip, will also be an absentee. He has delegated the duty of representing the youngest of the Australian States to its London Agent-General, Sir Horace Tozer. The only State of the Commonwealth that seems likely to be directly represented at the coronation by its Premier is little Tasmania.

How to Economize With Eggs

Left-over yolks of eggs if put at once into a "tumbler" of cold water will keep fresh and soft for several days. If dropped into a cup and covered the yolks would be unfit for use the second day. The left-over whites of eggs may be made into macaroons, kisses, or used for meringues. The whites of two eggs with a quarter of a pound of sugar and the same quantity of almond paste will make two dozen macaroons. Where hard-boiled yolks are wanted it is much better to break the eggs, separate carefully the yolks from the whites and drop the yolks into water that is boiling hot, cook slowly for twenty minutes. In this way you save the whites for another purpose.—Mrs. S. T. Rorer, in The Ladies' Home Journal.
