This was bad enough, but to my surprise when on my return home late in the afternoon I saw the same poor shivering dumb beasts, evidently having been out all day with the thermometer below zero and a strong wind from the North. If this is not cruelty to animals I would like to know what is? The agent of the S. P. C. A. should take this matter up at once, or failing him the authorities of the town, locate the owner and prosecute him to the full extent of the law, and if I might be permitted to suggest to the magistrate who would try the case he might order the owner of these poor dumb beasts to be hunched to the pump without outer clothing for twenty-four hours. A ROLL CALL—AN ORDINATION SERVICE AND MEETING OF KINGS CO. BAPTIST CONFERENCE. Interesting services were held at Gaspereau on Monday and Tuesday of the present week. The first was the roll-call of the church beginning at 2.30 p. m. The service began with an address by Rev. F. H. Beals, of Canada. He spoke of David in his generation, and deduced a few striking lessons, showing that every one should find an all his appointed place in his generation; that he should know his mission to the world about him; that he should be correctly related to the former generation, and to that which follows his own; and that he must remember the brevity of the period in which he has to serve. It was a masterly effort.

An ordination service was held in the evening, when four persons, previously chosen by their brethren, were solemnly set apart to fill the office of deacon. The sermon was delivered by Dr. A. Cochran from the passage in 1st Timothy, that relates to the qualifications and character expected of the deacon, and the rewards of faithfulness to the solemn trust. Rev. L. D. Morse gave the charge to the deacons, and Rev. J. D. Spidell, a former pastor, addressed the church.

The County Conference held their sessions on Friday. Rev. D. W. Grandall presented the scriptural view of the doctrine of future punishment. This was followed by a brief discussion. An "old fashioned" conference meeting was announced for the afternoon meeting. This was conducted by the Rev. Asaph Whitman. Rev. G. P. Raymond spoke in the evening on Bible study in its relation to character. It was an able and instructive address. He was followed by Rev. M. P. King, who had for his theme "The terms of the Commission." This address was an earnest and timely presentation of the command of Jesus to his disciples to give his gospel to the world. E.
