GRADE IX.

Number of candidates 34. Number who passed 27.

Three others obtained certificates one grade below that applied for. Only four, therefore, out of the thirty-four completely failed.

The certificates obtained at these examinations are of two kinds, viz.: A "High School Pass" and a "Teacher's Pass." A "Teacher's Pass" requires an average of 60, English not lower than 65, other subjects not lower than 47. A "High School Pass" requires an average of 50 with no mark below 30.

Eighteen of the certificates received this year were "Teacher's Passes" distributed among the grades as follows: In grade XI, the first four in the list; in grade X, the first three; in grade IX, all except Nos. 9 and 13.

The following good records are worthy of full publication: Grade IX Chas. Collins, English 71, Latin 78, French 68, history 73, algebra 80, geometry 100—average 78.3.

Grade X, Margaret Chase, English 72, French 66, algebra 80, history 75, geometry 75—average 75. Grade IX, Grace Foster, English 64, Latin 82, French 56, geography 75, arithmetic 91, algebra 98—average 84.6. Francis Archibald, English 74, Latin 84, French 78, geography 84, arithmetic 79, algebra 98—average 82.8. Donald Grant, English 72, Latin 80, French 69, geography 81, arithmetic 94, Algebra 95—Average 83.6.

SEALED TENDERS addressed to the undersigned, and endorsed "Tender for Dredging, Yarmouth, N. S.," will be received until 1:00 P.M., Thursday, September 4, 1913, for dredging required at Yarmouth, N.S.

Tenders will not be considered unless made on the forms supplied, and signed with the actual signatures of the tenderer.

Combined specification and form of tender can be obtained on application to the Secretary, Department of Public Works, Ottawa. Tenders must include the towing of the plant to and from the work. Dredges and tugs not owned and registered in Canada shall not be employed in the performance of the work contracted for. Contractors must be ready to begin work within thirty days after the date they have been notified of the acceptance of their tender.
