## Personal Mention Nfldrs. in Boston

We are glad to welcome to our office during the week Mr. Llewellyn Colley, formerly of the teaching staff of Bishop Field College, St. John's. Mr. Colley has been attending the summer session at Columbia University, New York, for the past six weeks taking a special course in Education and History, and his friends will be glad to learn that he passed successfully the examinations incident thereto. Columbia University is one of the largest educational establishments in the world in point of the number of students enrolled, there being at the present time some 13,000 names on the lists, representing 400 countries and states all over the world.

Mr. Colley left Boston on Tuesday and intends visiting relatives and friends in Rochester, Niagara Falls, Detroit and Toronto before returning to St. John's.

We were also glad to receive a visit from two other well-known Newfoundlanders—Hon. F. McNamara and Mr. Levi Chafe. Both gentlemen left St. John's in the beginning of July on the S.S. Caronia which took Earl Haig and party back to England. Hon. Mr. McNamara, who is a member of the Legislative Council of Newfoundland, was a visitor to the British Empire Exhibition at Wembley and included Paris, Dublin, Cork and Killarney in his trip. During his stay in London he was a guest at a reception at Buckingham Palace. He arrived in Boston on the 16th inst., by the S.S. Celtic and left on Tuesday for New York to connect with the S.S. Rosalind for St. John's.

Mr. Levi Chafe made an extended visit to Europe, and in addition to being present at the British Empire Exhibition and the reception at Buckingham Palace, visited various cities in Scotland and Ireland. He also made a tour of the battlefields of France and Belgium where the lads of "Ours" had been in action and placed wreaths on several of the graves. While in Amiens Cathedral he noticed a tablet had been erected in memory of two members of the Newfoundland Regiment, Ptes. Templeman and McGrath.
