

Synopsis of Coal Mining Regulations.

Coal mining right of the Dominion.

In Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, the Yukon Territory, the North-west Territories and in a portion of the Province of British Columbia may be leased for a term of twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$1. an acre. Not more than 2,560 acres will be leased to one applicant.

Applications for a lease must be made by the applicant in person to the Agent or Sub-agent in the district in which the rights applied for

In surveyed territory the land must be described by sections, or legal sub-divisions of sections, and in un surveyed territory the tract applied for shall be staked out by the appli-

Rach application must be accom-panied by a fee of \$5 which will be re-funded if the rights applied for are not available, but not otherwise. A royalty shall be paid on the merch-antable output of the mine at the

rate of five cents per ton. The person operating the mine shall furnish the agent with sworn returns accounting for the full quantity of merchantable coal mined and pay the royalty thereon. If the coal mining rights are not being operated, such returns should be furnished at least once a year.

The lease will include the coal mining rights only, but the lease may

be permitted to purchase whatever available surface rights may be considered necessary for the working of the mine at the rate of \$10.00 an For full information application should be made to the Secretary of the Department of the Interior, Ot-
