## REPORT BOARD OF HEALTH:

Annual Report of Health and Deaths in Fredericton.

Very Low Death Rate Last Year—No Epidemic.

Vital Statistics Giving Deaths by Months and Causes of Death.

The annual report of the secretary of the local Board of Health, Mr. C. W. Beckwith, to the provincial Board has been prepared, and is as follows:—  
The Board of Health of the city of Fredericton as at present constituted is as follows: Dr. W. J. Weaver, chairman, Havelock Coy, John M. Wiley, James S. Nall and James Farrell.

During the past year the city has been spared from all epidemics and the health of the city has been above the average, as appears from the statistics and mortality returns. In consequence of the prevalence of smallpox at St. John and other places in the autumn of 1901, your Board deemed it advisable to take every possible precaution against the spread of the disease in their district, and published notices advising general vaccination; and also appointed a physician to vaccinate persons unable to pay for the same. Under this arrangement 62 persons were vaccinated by the physician employed by the Board. Your Board also caused provision to be made for the isolation of any smallpox cases that might occur in their district by repairing and furnishing the isolation hospital in the "Alms house grounds" and having the same made suitable for occupation as an infectious disease hospital. The same is still maintained ready for use at any time.

There have been no cases of smallpox in the city during the past year, one suspected case proving to be only chicken pox. In the month of March last a commercial traveler just arrived in the city was reported by a city physician to be a suspected case of smallpox and was at once isolated by order of this Board. This occurred on Saturday and on the following Monday Dr. Morris of St. John came here at the request of the Board to attend to the case and reported it as not being smallpox. The Inspector, Mr. R. H. Phillips, has since the case was fully examined all premises in this district and caused all offensive matter to be removed. Your Board is satisfied that the state of the city as to cleanliness is generally satisfactory.

## BYE ELECTION

The Contest in Maisonneuve Postponed Until December 9.

MONTREAL, Nov. 19.—It is officially announced that the bye election in Maisonneuve, made vacant by the appointment of Mr. Prefontaine to the Cabinet, has been postponed. The original date set for polling day was December 3, but the returning officer found it impossible to affix the proclamation within the legal time, largely owing to the rapid growth of the population in this constituency, which calls for an additional seven polls over the number required in 1900, making a total of 108 polls for the division. The date now set for polling is December 9. The announcement places nomination day as December 1st.

## GIBSON MANUFACTURING CO.

The Plan for Its Reorganization Being Discussed at St. John.

Mr. Gibson in Conference With Halifax Capitalists.

A Satisfactory Conclusion Almost Sure to be Reached.

ST. JOHN, Nov. 19.—John F. Stairs and Max Aitken, of Halifax, are in town today in consultation with Mr. Alexander Gibson and Lieut. Col. McLean, regarding the reorganization and recapitalization of the Gibson Manufacturing Company. Mr. Gibson and his friends were in conference all morning and it is understood, although nothing has yet been allowed to creep out, that on all the principal points under consideration satisfactory conclusions have been reached.

## CANADA IN LONDON.

Floating Stock of Atlantic, Quebec and Western Railway—New C. P. R. Steamer Launched.

MONTREAL, Nov. 18.—The Star's London cable says: The prospectus will be issued tomorrow of a new Canadian company recently registered here, with a capital of \$100,000, all ordinary stock, in order to acquire from Charles Carpenter of Gaspe, the charter for the Atlantic, Quebec and Western railway. The object is to build a railway from Gaspe to a point north of Causapac, where junction will be effected with the Intercolonial. Preliminary notices of the press make a great flourish about the railway as the fast mail route and dwell upon the difficulties of St. Lawrence navigation and the commercial loss thereby.

The new British Columbia three per cent. loan of £721,000, issued at 92, is believed to be unsuccessful. The stock is now purchasable at a small discount, whereas the new Natal three per cent. are dealt in at a premium. It is feared overborrowing of the colonies will spoil the British market again, just when they are recovering from the last long spell of overborrowing.

The new Canadian Pacific Railway Co's steamer for the Vancouver-Victoria service was launched on the Clyde today, Mrs. Archer Baker, wife of the Canadian Pacific's European manager, performing the ceremony.
