J. W. WALKER IS MAYOR MARYSVILLE

Ex-Mayor Stafford Defeated by 84 Votes in Contest Yesterday.

(Special despatch to The Daily Gleaner) Marysville, N. B., April 6.—The mayoralty contest resulted in the election of J. W. Walker. At No. 1 pole Walker received 49 votes while Stafford received 10; at No. 2 pole Walker received 70 votes and Stafford 24; total, Walker 119, Stafford 34. After the town clerk had announced the result ex-Mayor Stafford thanked his friends who had supported him, also those who had by their votes given him a rest from civic politics, and assured those present that he would still work for the welfare and interest of the town and that he would again at some future date offer for councilor at least. During ex-Mayor Stafford's two years' service as the chief magistrate of Marysville he was a faithful and energetic official and accomplished much good for the town. Alex. Gibson's condition was slightly improved yesterday.

CLAIM TITLE TO QUEBEC CITY LANDS

Several Claimants for Valuable Sites Within the City Limits.

Quebec, April 5.—Following the three Ottawa citizens and the Montreal woman who claim title to the estate of Louis Herbert, first settler of Canada, whose claims cover part of the upper town of this city, there comes another big claim.

This time the claimants allege relationship to Samuel De Champlain, the founder of Quebec City, and are Mr. Albert Boule and Mrs. E. Spauld, both of Quebec.

The estate claimed covers part of Place Hill, the present site of the Citadel, the site of the Federal Observatory, Cove Fields, site of the Ross Rifle factory, the site of the Quebec jail and other smaller places, a total of approximately nine square miles, in the centre of the city. The claimants value the estate at \$25,000,000.

MEMENTO FROM PRINCE.

Brantford, Ont., April 5.—His Majesty's Chapel Royal St. Paul, of the Mohawks, of this city, the oldest church in Upper Canada, Sunday afternoon, formally received an autographed photograph of the Prince of Wales, given as a memento to His Royal Highness' visit here last October. This Indian church has a communion set which was presented by Queen Anne.

BIG PROFITS IN RUBBER.

New York, April 5.—Net income of the U. S. Rubber Co. for 1919, after providing for depreciation of plants and adequate reserves for Canadian, British and federal taxes, amounted to \$21,396,099, according to the annual report. Deducting \$2,655,862 for interest charges, leaves net profits of \$18,740,237.

Ivan Leslie Clewley.

The death of Ivan Leslie Clewley, which occurred at the hospital in this city on Thursday, March 31st, was a loss of which regret by many friends. Mr. Clewley was the son of the late Albert H. and Adella Clewley, of St. Stephen, and was 47 years of age. Death was caused by paralysis. Mr. Clewley was for a number of years a valued employee of the Hartt Boot and Shoe Co., and later had been employed with the John Palmer Co. He was an attendant of the Brunswick street Baptist church and was highly esteemed by all who knew him. He leaves to mourn his widow, formerly Miss Margaret McMorran, of St. Stephen, and three sons and five daughters, his eldest son being with the Royal North West Mounted Police. Much sympathy is expressed for them all in their bereavement. The remains were taken to St. Stephen on Thursday night, and the funeral services were conducted on Friday by the Rev. P. H. Holmes at the home of Mr. W. H. Stevens. The pall bearers were Mr. Joseph McMorran and Mr. Daniel McMorran, brothers-in-law of the deceased, and Mr. George D. Moore and Mr. Albert Douglas.

MARY MAY STILL BE MRS. OWEN MOORE

Bomb Dropped Into Honeymoon of Mrs. Douglas Fairbanks by Authorities.

Los Angeles, April 5.—A bombshell was hurled into the honeymoon happiness of Mary Pickford and Douglas Fairbanks this afternoon by the flat announcement from the office of the Attorney General of Nevada that a suit would be filed in the name of the people of Douglas county to set aside the decree of divorce granted Mary Pickford on March 2 from her husband, Owen Moore, at Minden, Nev. Such action, if successful, would render illegal the marriage of Mary Pickford to Douglas Fairbanks last Sunday night.

The probe of the divorce decree granted Miss Pickford was started by a resolution of the Nevada Bar Association, which demanded that the Attorney General make an investigation to ascertain whether or not the decree was obtained by collusion and fraud.

The announcement is now made that the investigation has been carried far enough to warrant the statement that such suit would be filed. In order to secure a decree in Nevada a person seeking divorce must swear that he or she intends to make his or her permanent home in the State. Mary Pickford, when she filed suit at Minden against Owen Moore, took such an oath.

The fact that she left the State shortly after the decree was granted and returned to California, where she had lived for years, and within a few days married a man who has his permanent residence here, is regarded, it is said, as a prima facie case of collusion and fraud.

The fact also that the husband, Owen Moore, was conveniently located a mile or two away, when it was necessary to serve him with the papers in the case, is looked at with considerable suspicion by the Nevada officials.
