side the door. Jaggard wanted to get another drink, but Barker said he would not give it to him, whereupon Jaggard got angry and pushed his hand through a pane of glass in the door, which caused him to get his arm cut. Barker was emphatic in his denial of the statement that he had had a knife in his possession.

Judge Snider, in summing up the case, said that if the evidence of Jaggard was taken alone it would have made Barker guilty on all counts. However, His Honor said that he could only find Barker guilty on the charge of cutting and wounding. If there had been any reasonable doubt in the matter, His Honor said, he would have given Barker the benefit of it, but as far as he could see it was plain that he had committed the offence. His Honor said that to stab a man meant murder, and the law was very severe in such matters. Judge Snider said that it was not in his power to impose a fine in such a case, and he passed sentence of 18 months in Central Prison.

Barker asked if there was any way of appealing the decision, and His Honor said that it could be done through a higher court.

Three Years for Anderson.

Three years in the Kingston Penitentiary was the sentence that Judge Snider handed out to Frank Anderson, the purse snatcher, who was found guilty of stealing a purse and \$12 from Catherine Burgoyne on the 5th of November, and also stealing a purse and \$9 from Miss Catherine Duncan on August 24th last. The evidence in both cases was very strong against the prisoner. When the Judge had sentenced him, Anderson said, "Well, I won't come out alive." To this His Honor replied, "That I hope you will come out a better man."

Two for Quackenbush.

Harry Quackenbush was given two years in prison being found guilty of breaking into the residence of Andrew Linklater on April 11 last, and stealing a gold watch and several other pieces of jewelry.

EATEN BY RATS.

Baby's Hands Badly Chewed by the Rodents.

This was the terrible experience of Mrs. Rebecca Yanofsky's 15-month-old daughter, at her home, 601 St. Lawrence Main street. The child was taken to the General Hospital this morning suffering much from the lacerations of the rodents' teeth. The baby was sleeping in a room next her mother's and her screams awakened her parent who drove the hungry animals away. The rats attacked them but a strenuous use of a broom put them to flight. The infant's hands were badly torn, and had the mother not appeared opportunely they would probably have been chewed off completely. The hospital authorities say that it is rarely they have such cases, but at the same time they warn parents to see that their babies are safeguarded against attacks of rats, which seem to have a liking for human flesh.

DOUBLE SUICIDE.

Tie Themselves Together and Jump into Thames.

New York, Nov. 26.—A special cable from London to the Times says: Another story reflecting the bitter struggle for existence of a section of the literary and artistic world here came to light to-day with the discovery in the Thames of the bodies of Alexander Good and his wife. Both were authors and Mrs. Good was also a painter of rare talent. The couple tied themselves together and jumped into the river, after losing hope in a battle against big odds. Carefully enclosed in waterproof paper in the garments of both were found letters addressed to the coroner. They have not been opened as yet. The couple disappeared from the cheap lodgings to which they had been reduced, on November 4, leaving their last remnants for their landlady, and a letter to a friend, saying in part: "If you think of us in the future, do not do so sadly. Remember that we shall be asleep together and what is better than sleep after the long day's work."

ARE THEY LOST?

Halifax, Nov. 26.—The schooner Angler left St. Pierre sixty days ago for France with a crew and a few fishermen, numbering altogether 75. No tidings of the vessel or the crew has been heard since. The majority of the lost men hailed from France, and leave wives and families.
