"Dry" Christmas Robs Police Court Coffers

The only complaint in regard to poor Christmas business The Advocate has been able to find in Newcastle is registered by Chief of Police Lucas. "The town had a 'dry' Christmas—consequently at least in former years Christmas has been a rather busy season for Newcastle's police force. Aided and abetted by a plentiful supply of booze there usually have been a number of citizens who celebrated the holiday not wisely but too well, with the result that the after-Christmas session of the police court was devoted largely to the consideration of numbers of charges of 'drunk,' 'drunk and disorderly' and sometimes more serious charges resulting from intoxication.
Christmas this year brought no riot to the magistrate's mill. For the last month, practically, Chief Lucas has been exemplifying the truth of the epigram that 'they also serve who only stand and wait.' Since Dec. 2 the chief has served the town principally by standing and waiting, for since that date no arrest has been made in Newcastle. N. B. John Barlevorn contributed nothing to the police court coffers this Christmas. Whether or not booze is sold in Newcastle is an uncertainty. By the initiated it is probably obtainable. But it is not being sold openly, and evidently it is not being so freely consumed as it has been in times past, remote and recent.
Chief of Police Lucas and his co-officer, Inspector John H. Ashford, credited with having made an earnest effort to enforce the law respecting the sale of liquor, and appearances indicate that they have succeeded beyond the point ever reached by any other police force. Act officers, who ever served the town, in doing so they seem to have helped numbers of erstwhile booze consumers to save a good portion of their hard earned dollars with which they were wont to acquire jags and pay fines.
If the elimination or reduction of the case may be, of the sale of intoxicating liquor in Newcastle has hurt business, that circumstance is hard to explain. Elsewhere in this issue of The Union Advocate a large number of merchants state that Christmas business this year was better than it was last year. Some say it was the best Christmas season they have ever had.

The statements from Newcastle merchants, published below, were evoked by the question: "How was business this Christmas and this year, as compared with last year?"
John Ferguson & Sons, General Merchants, (Mr. John Ferguson), "Business generally this year has been better with us than it was last year. Christmas business was better than last year's but in view of our general increase not so good as might have been expected."
The Lounsbury Co. Ltd., Farming implements, Furniture, Furs, etc. (Mr. C. G. Hayward), "Our Newcastle business has shown a healthy growth during the year, and our Christmas business was a decided improvement over that of last year."
Russell & Morrison, Men's Clothing and Furnishings, (Mr. Percy Russell), "We can't complain. Business was very good, and for the Christmas season totalled more than last year, notwithstanding the fact that we then handled boots and shoes which line we discontinued last April."
Moody & Co. Dry Goods, Ladies wear, etc. (Mr. H. R. Moody), "Business for Christmas week was better than last year. Saturday was particularly good and the last three days of the week were the best we have ever had."
A. H. McKay, Dry Goods and Toys etc. (Mr. A. H. McKay), "We had all the business we could handle, but I am not sure business was better than it was last year."
D. W. Stohart, Hardware and groceries, (Mr. D. W. Stohart), "We were very busy. Business was satisfactory, and better than last year, although we could not get much of the goods we had on order."
Dickson & Gray, Druggists, Toilet Sets, candies, etc. (Mr. C. H. Dickson), "Our Christmas trade was very nice and I am perfectly satisfied. We are practically sold out of Christmas goods." (Mr. J. H. Troy), "Business was better than last year."
Stohart Mercantile Co. Limited, Hardware, etc. (Mr. Chas. P. Stohart), "Saturday's business was better than the day before Christmas last year. Cash sales were better than ever, and we cleared up our Christmas stock."
Bank of Nova Scotia, (Mr. S. L. Kerr, Manager), "From my observation, and what I have been told I should say that Christmas business in Newcastle was particularly good, and better than last year. The merchants all seem to have been very busy."
George Stables, groceries, (Mr. Jas. Stables), "The best ever Christmas week was the biggest week we ever had. This month this year has shown the highest sales in the corresponding month last year—some by as much as \$1000."
R. M. Faudel & Co., General Merchants, (Mr. R. M. Faudel), "Satisfactory, the whole week business was better than that of the corresponding period last year, by at least 25 per cent. The people seemed to have plenty of money."
Royal Bank of Canada, (Mr. E. A. McCurdy, manager), "There is abundant proof that Newcastle's Christmas trade was much greater this year than it was in 1915. Business in the town and district is certainly very busy."
A. D. Farrar & Co., General Wholesale and Retail Merchants, (Mr. C. G. Coudart), "Our Christmas business was fine. Mr. Farrar says it was much better than last year. Business with us for the year has been much longer than last year's, and our wholesale trade is increasing very rapidly."
