guests of Mr. and Mrs. J. Cooke.

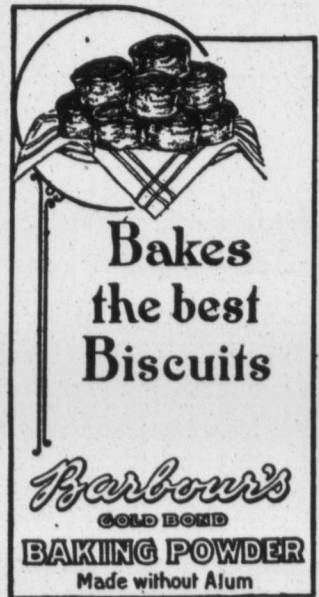
Mr. G. S. Hawkins, accountant in

A MINISTERIAL PROPHECY

Sir Lomer Gouin, minister of jus-
tice, in the present Canadian Govern-
ment, is an enthusiast, not altogeth-
er governed by wise zeal, or free from
an overheated imagination.

We have only had the first session
of the new Parliament, yet he boasts
of what it has accomplished already
and claims for it the confidence of
the people. In fact, with him, the re-
cord is such a glorious one; that he
predicts, referring specially to
Liberals; "we will be in power for at
least fifteen years."

It would be interesting to know just
what great thing the Government,
under the leadership of Premier King,
has accomplished, to merit the un-
stinted praise of even Sir Lomer Gouin.
He must know, to say the least of it,
that men, just as great as he, just as
well able to judge, just as astute poli-
ticians, men of parliamentary prac-
tice and action, even superior to his
career, entirely differ with him, and
are not so lost in the mire of political
partnership, as to call black; white.

It is perhaps, we suppose only na-
tural for Sir Lomer to feel so very
good about the government in which
he holds ministerial place. Some
even go so far as to call him "Boss"
of the crowd, and possible they wish
he was Premier in reality. He has
shown such an attitude for political
partnership, even in appointments to
the bench, that hungry followers in
the party, can see in him, "a worthy
brother who would give them full
benefit of the doctrine" to the victors
belong the spoils.

The tactics adopted by the party
of the present government, when
seeking power, driving the pre-elec-
tion canvass, both on and off the
stage, cannot and will not be forgot-
ten. If confidence of the people they
obtained, it was obtained by open
political humbug and false promises.
They even smashed their own po-
litical platform, built up by a conven-
tion of their party and gave us in-
stead "a scrap of paper" in the shape
of a "chart," which they may follow,
or may not follow, just as the po-
litical game suits. We were to be re-
lieved of burdens, which they have
increased, and if succeeding sessions
show no better results for the benefit
of Canada, Sir Lomer's fifteen years,
will be black enough to place a blot
upon a century.

He also touches upon the Railway
question, and goes so far as to say
"if any man can make the state rail-
ways succeed, I believe that man is
Sir Henry Thornton." The question
very naturally comes to the front, in
view of Sir Lomer's views often ex-
pressed about State or public owner-
ship of our Railways, does he wish
State Ownership to be a success? It
is well known that the Quebec wing
of the Liberal party, would rather see
our railways turned into private cor-
porations. It is not perhaps as wide-
ly remembered that a great deal of
the financial burdens imposed by the
Railways are solely and wholly the
offspring of Liberal tactics and blun-
dering. Their Thirteen Million Dol-
lar new and unneeded—at the time—
Transcontinental line, took us down
for one hundred million, or so more,
until finally railway affairs became
so mixed up, and financially unsettled,
that Canada had to take them
over, or let them go to rot. Notwith-
standing the increased heavy strain
placed upon the people, the Govern-
ment of the time took the only wise

MONEY IN LAMBS

Charlottetown Guardian: Mr. Chas.
McIsaac brought in to O'Leary Tues-
day possibly the best lambs marketed
on P. E. Island this season. If there
are any better ones, the writer would
like to hear of them through the
press. In all eleven lambs weighed
1426 lbs., an average of nearly 130
lbs. each for which he received at
9 1/2 c. per lb. \$135.47. Mr. McIsaac is
one of the farmers who believes in
marketing the best and considers
anything smaller than this in lambs
"Merely broaders". The above were
sold to Mr. A. G. Berry, of Sussex,
who will verify the above statements.
Large numbers of lambs continue
to be shipped from Montague this fall
several carloads already having been
shipped. The price paid being nine
cents per pound or nearly nine dol-
lars for a lamb. When the weather
gets cooler, these animals will be
killed here and shipped as dressed
meat. Some of the farmers are re-
ceiving from this source alone as
much as for their whole crop of pota-
toes. The raising of sheep is one of
our best paying industries and while
the majority of the farmers are en-
gaged in it, the pity is all of them
are not. It is said the wealth of
Australia is due to its sheep raising.
Large quantities of Australian wool
finds its way into the United States
and Canadian markets.
