On 279 Special Trains, C. G. Railways

Up to March 1st 757,400 Troops have travelled over Government Railways.

Thousands arrive each week at Halifax and are sent forward to Dispersal Areas.

Since the war began in 1914 up to March 1st, when S.S. Belgic disembarked her returned soldier passengers at Halifax 757,-400 troops have been carried on special trains over the Canadian Josennment Railways.

The first train which carried croops over the Government Railways the year the war was declared was numbered one and all special troop trains to and from Halifax since that time have been numbered consecutively. The last train from the Belgie was on Saturday No 1279. Each train averages about twelve cars with an average of 50 men to a car, which figures up a course in addition to this thousands of soldiers have journeyed between Montreal and Halifax

The movement of troops back o Canada is now approaching it greatest activity. Last Sunday and fifteen special trains were despatched westward inside of

fourteen hours. S. S. Megantie with soldiers and dependants arrived Wednes-Ch'town, Oct. 28, 1920. day and S. S. Adriadic is due Sunday. The movement of returnmen is to be kept up actively.


