Those dairymen who made provision for green feed succeeded in keeping up the flow of milk throughout the season and were thus able to take advantage of the comparatively high prices paid for dairy products during the year. During the season 59 creameries and 12 cheese factories were operated, as against 53 creamand 11 cheese factories last year. The output aggregated about 85 per cent. of that of 1909. The shortage in volume should be nearly made un in value, however, as the government creameries alone have realized an average price of nearly 26 cents a creameries.
