Job Bros. positively that Engineer McFarlane would not be allowed to take the said position, owing to him being employed by the Government. But, no, Sir Edward acted the coward in this instance, fearing that he would lose the political support of Hon. W. C. Job and he therefore sacrificed us his time-honoured supporters and permitted this outrage to be finalized so as to curry favour with the "merchandise."

In conclusion let me inform our Tory Premier, Sir Edward Morris, that his action in this matter is severely condemned and that on polling day next November, both himself and his colleagues, Messrs. McCarthy accompanying them with the organ. The bazaar will close at 6 to-day to enable arrangements to be made for the dance to be held to-night, so that purchasers should be about early. The band of the C. C. C. will play at the dance, and this we feel assured will be largely attended.

The Police Court.

A man charged with being drunk and disorderly in his own house was convicted and fined \$5 or 14 days.

Several truckmen were summoned for driving horses and carts without licenses. All but two settled up. The two defaulters were each fined \$2 or 7 days and were given till Saturday to pay the tax.

Outbreak of Strange Disease.

An outbreak of a strange disease, and of a serious nature, was reported yesterday to have occurred at Flower's Cove, a message being received in the city. Two deaths have occurred. The disease was unknown to the people of that part of the coast, although they knew by its symptoms that it was contagious. The Colonial Secretary wired for full particulars of the ailment and got a reply that the faces and throats of the people who had contracted the illness were swollen and very sore and that the illness of the deceased patients who had succumbed to the attack on the 22nd and 23rd inst., lasted a week. In answer to a question whether the disease was still prevalent, the Colonial Secretary was informed that it was. Dr. Brehm, Medical Health Officer, was acquainted of the matter and he took immediate action. He communicated with Dr. Fisher who joined the Home at Bay of Islands for Flower's Cove, having instructions to tend on those who are stricken with the unknown sickness. The strictest measures have been taken to try and stamp out the disease.
