RUSSIA AND ROUMANIA.

PETROGRAD, Jan. 18. A dangerous state has arisen in relations between Roumania and the Bolsheviks. A two-hour ultimatum has been sent to the Roumanian military authorities by the Revolutionary Committee of the 9th Russian Army demanding a free passage to the Russian troops through Jassy.

MORE PEACE PROPOSALS.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 18. Senator Lewis of Illinois said today, each planning new early peace proposals. I have reason to know, says the Senator, that Berlin expects to withdraw her peace proposals to the Bolsheviks and make new proposals but proposals which will be applicable not only to Russia, but to all her opponents.

STRIKES AND RIOTS IN AUSTRIA.

LONDON, Jan. 18. Serious strikes accompanied by riots have taken place in Vienna and other cities of Austria, according to News Agency telegrams to Zurich. Other points of Switzerland. A meeting of workers in a peace demonstration at Vienna on Tuesday night ended in a riot, during which the exchange telegraph despatch food shops were looted. A wireless press despatch from Berne, says the strikes broke out on Monday morning in factories in Vienna, Brno (Graz), Brunn, Linz, and Wenen, and Neustadt, the walkouts resulting in a riot which necessitated vigorous police action.

WHAT BERLIN SAYS OF AMERICA'S ARMY.

LONDON, Jan. 18. Commenting upon the statement made by Secretary of War Baker before the Congress committee regarding war preparation, the semi-official Nord Deutsche Allgemeine Zeitung of Berlin, says: "The American Secretary of War speaks of the American Army in France. There is an American army in France, but it consists entirely of wood cutters, railway workers and other civilians. For the three divisions, whose precious lives are being spared in quiet places far behind the front, Secretary Baker speaks as if shortly there would be 1,500,000 Americans in France. Can the United States spare such a large number of men? The answer is no, because a large part of the army must stay behind for protection of frontiers, coast, colonies and for other duties of a political nature. The political situation compels the United States to keep home a greater portion of her army and the country can at most put only 400,000 or 500,000 in European battlefields. For the transfer even of this number 250,000 tons of shipping will be required necessitating 650 journeys of ships of 3,000 tons to 5,000 tons. Thus the army of even this small size can possibly be made available before the summer of 1918, in a decision on the west front this spring American par-
