Mr. Cullen Receives a Threatening Letter.

Editor Evening Telegram.
Dear Sir.—Yesterday afternoon I received a threatening letter, dated Dec. 7, 1920. It was worded as follows:

"I, Cullen, Esq.
"Dear Sir.—You are hereby advised by an unknown friend that unless you discontinue your open attacks on the Roman Catholics and the Roman Catholic Church of this city and country you will receive a satisfaction that in the severity of its application (upon your person), will teach you the lesson not to treat with disrespect a religious body whose honour and name you are aiming at. Be warned and desist. From such future dangerous work.

A FRIEND."

Now, sir, I am at a loss to account for the meaning of this letter, or the intention of the person who sent it. But he insinuates a distinct lie, for in none of my letters have I made any mention of "the Roman Catholics and the Roman Catholic Church in this city and country." My writings dealt solely with the Irish question and Irish history, and had nothing whatever to do with this country, nor any other but the one mentioned. Consequently, I do not offer any apology to any person in this country, nor to any institution in this country, for I do not consider that there is any apology due. But I do assert my right to free speech on any subject concerning the British Empire, and, as a patriot, I mean to maintain that right, which I shall use in defence of that Empire. And I say to you, Mr. "Friend," that anonymous letters and threats will not deter me from writing to the press whenever I think it necessary. I am of English blood, and while a drop of that blood remains in my veins, I mean to use it in the cause of that mighty and glorious nation of which I am so proud. And I beg to suggest, Mr. "Friend," that if you wished to turn two-thirds of the people of Newfoundland against the idea of an "Irish Republic," you could not have thought out a better way of accomplishing it than by sending anonymous threats, for there's nothing that makes the blood of a good Protestant boil like underhand methods of procedure; cowardice is not a thing that we can admire. I beg to advise that just as long as I may deem it necessary I shall continue to refute mis-statements made by separatist advocates.

Royal Hot Griddle Cakes
2 cups flour
1/2 teaspoon salt

1/2 cup shortening

Griddle Cakes with Eggs
1 1/2 cups flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon Royal Baking Powder
3 eggs
1/2 cup milk
1/2 cup shortening
Mix and sift dry ingredients; add beaten eggs, milk and melted shortening; mix well. Bake immediately on hot griddle.

Backheat Cakes
1 cup buckwheat flour
1 cup flour
1/2 cup milk
1/2 cup water
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup molasses
1/2 cup shortening
Sift together flour, baking powder and salt; add liquid, molasses and melted shortening; beat three minutes. Bake on hot greased griddle.

Waffles
3 cups flour
1/2 cup milk
1/2 cup water
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup molasses
1/2 cup shortening
Sift flour, baking powder and salt together; add milk to yolks of eggs; mix thoroughly and add to dry ingredients; add melted shortening and mix in beaten whites of eggs. Bake in well greased hot waffle iron until brown. Serve hot with maple syrup. It should take about 1 1/2 minutes to bake each waffle.
