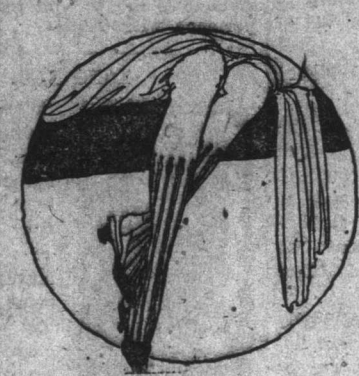

## War Measures Act Repealed.

### Opposition Members Deliver Its Funeral Orations--D'Arcy Exploration Co Resolutions Pass the House.

The War Measures Act—that in-laudable measure through which the country was brought to the verge of economic ruin—has now been wiped off the Statute Book and there are none who mourn its loss except the Executive Government. But it was not so much an Act of such magnitude—were its effect good or bad—should depart without fitting obsequies, and the Opposition members appropriated to themselves the right of acting as chief mourners, and in a manner worthy of the occasion, delivered the funeral orations, and so ended the War Measures Act. Requested in Pace.

The House met at 2:15 p.m. After the pressing of petitions, Notice of Question was given by Sir Michael Cashin.

Sir John Crosbie, on privilege, referred to the utter impossibility of carrying the Conception Bay crews to Labrador or the few boats on the service. The only ships on the service were the Dasher, Banquet and Sagona, and these ships could not possibly carry the crews and their motor boats. Cupids' crews and motor boats alone would fill the harbor, he said. Sir Edmund Donald was the most popular ship amongst all Conception Bay crews, and he thought they were entitled to having their own ship. He charged that the Edmund Donald was chartered to the Reid Newfoundland Co. He didn't care what boat was put on it only an extra boat was added to those already on the service, and he repeated that Cupids alone would fill the harbor to capacity. Under every government the fishermen have been going to Labrador like cattle. He wanted them to receive proper accommodation.

The Minister of Justice endorsed Sir John Crosbie's remarks. Sir John Crosbie then referred to the fact that the Dasher, Banquet and Sagona were only cattle boats and he endorsed all Sir John Crosbie's statements. He thought we should be delighted to know that the fishermen of Conception Bay are taking up the fishery. Money could not be spent in a fair way on the service, and the accommodation for men going to the Labrador.

The Prime Minister informed Sir Michael Cashin that the House would increase in railway fares and that the Government had not asked for a warship to be stationed here.

The Minister of Finance informed Sir J. C. Crosbie that Richard Kelly of Holyrood, who filed the petition against Mr. Woodford, was getting a salary of \$42 per month from the Government.

Capt. Lewis said the Government would do this for political purposes, but they ignored the Old Age Pensions in that district. He charged that Kelly did not earn his salary and if the Government intended to renege they should first discharge Kelly.

The Amendment to the Law Society Act was read a third time. The report of the Special Committee consisting of the Minister of Justice and Mr. Higgins, on the War Measures Act was put before the House in Committee of the Whole.

Sir Michael Cashin said we were now getting rid of one of the most dangerous Acts on the Statute Book. It had been one of the curses of Newfoundland. It was used to buttress the Fish Regulations when they failed in the Supreme Court, and it would not be an exaggeration to say that it had cost us millions of dollars. It was through this Act that Mr. Penny of Ramoth had lost \$80,000 on one cargo of fish. The Act was in the hands of unscrupulous men and they took every advantage of it. He was there this afternoon as a pall bearer and mourner to the weapon which Sir Michael had used to destroy Newfoundland.

Sir John Crosbie also said farewell to the Act. He said Mr. Bonar Law was a good man, but he was a bad man in that district. He charged that Kelly did not earn his salary and if the Government intended to renege they should first discharge Kelly.

Mr. Macdonnell was puzzled. The repeal of the War Measures Act meant the declaration of peace and yet a warship was ordered here to keep the peace. He suggested that the Minister of Education should prove that he was earning his salary by working out—by means of a quadratic equation in which x equalled the place where he now resides—the whereabouts of Mr. Crosbie. Mr. Macdonnell amused the House with one of two after dinner stories, and speeches of this sort from him would be most welcome to relieve the dry moments of debate on supply and kindred dry-as-dust questions. He concluded by stating that the House should have been decorated with bunting for the farewell of the War Measures Act.

Mr. Bennett joined in the general expression of regret at the departure of an old enemy. He reviewed the history of the Act and hoped the day would never come when such an act would be necessary again.

The Minister of Posts attempted an explanation in defence of the use of the Act by the present Government.

Sir John Crosbie took exception to certain remarks made by Mr. Halfyard and made some strong comment on them.

The Minister of Posts objected to Sir John being personal.

Sir John Crosbie thought it out of place for Mr. Halfyard to criticize others when he was small enough to dismiss a little girl in his department because her father voted for him. (Sir John.)

The Minister of Posts poked about in Rumanian Bonds and discovered to his sorrow that he had stirred up a hornet's nest, for Sir John told him enough about Rumanian Bonds to keep the Minister quiet for some time to come.

Mr. Bennett replied too, to the post-Minister of Posts, who twiddled the window cord in his corner seat and looked as if he wished he had not been so ready to champion his beloved chief. Mr. Bennett cited the famous case of Smith and Shipman, the Minister of Marine and Fisheries and the happenings consequent thereon.

Mr. Fox expressed his pleasure at the departure of the War Measures Act. He said it would have been perfectly alright if it had been in the hands of men who had some scruples. When, however, it was put in the hands of unscrupulous men it was different. The War Measures Act had been tortured by this Act. It had been killed by degrees. He referred in strong terms to the swapping of cheques by Mr. Coaker, whom he termed a menace to Newfoundland. Mr. Fox's speech was a fairly lengthy one and undoubtedly made the Government members sit up.

Mr. Vinnicombe joined his colleagues in bidding farewell to the W.M.A. Noting that the Prime Minister and Mr. Coaker were missing from the House he said they must have got out to weep. The schools of the island should be given a general holiday to celebrate the departure of the Act.

Mr. Walsh took no pains to hide his pleasure at the repeal of the Act. By this time there was barely a quorum present in the House, a fact to which Mr. Walsh drew attention.

Capt. Lewis spoke in a more serious strain than most of the other members when saying good-bye to the Act. He referred at some length to the conditions on the West Coast brought about by the War Measures Act.

At 6:40 p.m. recess was taken until 8 p.m.

SHORT NIGHT SESSION. The House resumed at 8 o'clock. Sir John Crosbie made some references to the repeal of the War Measures Act. He also congratulated the Attorney-General, on inducing D'Arcy Exploration Co. to develop our oil areas. He hoped that the Company would have success in its undertaking. They had a high standing and any discoveries that they made would be beneficial to Newfoundland. He gave his hearty support to the bill, after which the Committee rose and reported the Bill passed.

The Prime Minister informed the House that the resolutions respecting the Act to confirm an agreement between the Government and the Dominion Iron and Steel Co., Ltd., and the Nova Scotia Steel and Coal Company, Ltd., owing to error in the drafting had been delayed, and that it would be referred to a Select Committee, consisting of Hon. Minister of Marine and Fisheries, the Attorney-General, Mr. J. R. Bennett, Mr. W. J. Higgins and himself.

The Estimates were then taken up. Sir Michael Cashin before their consideration, asked the Prime Minister for particulars of the Sales Tax, which was to produce \$900,000 revenue.

The Prime Minister informed Sir Michael that the usual procedure with the Budget and Supply had been departed from, but that they might make some advance with the Estimates if the House carried on. The items that would be discussed could not be changed and until they came to the Fisheries, Education and Agricultural votes there was no need of discussion.

Sir Michael Cashin did not uphold this view, but thought that the House should know how this revenue of \$900,000 was to be raised before they discussed its expenditure. He thought that the Prime Minister should be satisfied with the progress made during the evening and he should give the House a holiday in order to celebrate the removal of the obnoxious War Measures Act.

The Budget was then dropped and the Prime Minister suggested proceeding with the Seal Fishery and the Expropriation of Codfish Act.

Sir Michael Cashin thought that it would be unfair to the Minister of Marine and Fisheries to discuss these matters during his absence and these also were deferred.

The Amendment to the Election Act was next brought up, but the Government was not prepared to go on with it. The Prime Minister in answer to a question by Mr. Bennett, informed the House that the Bill was not a party measure, that personally he favored the English Act without its qualifications, and the age set at 25 years.

After the leader of the Government promising to furnish particulars of the Sales Tax when supply would be introduced on Friday next, the House adjourned until 8 p.m. to-day.
