Memorial Service at Hr. Grace.

IMPRESSIVE CEREMONY IN ST. ANDREW'S CHURCH.

On Sunday last St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church held a Memorial Service, and a Tablet was unveiled and dedicated to the memory of Private James Matthew Cron and Sergeant Graham Duff, who fell in the Great War, 1914-1918. It was indeed a unique occasion in the history of that church. Every seat was taken up long before the service commenced, and many had to be content with standing space. The officiating clergymen were Rev. R. J. Power, M.A., of St. Andrew's Church, St. John's, and Rev. F. S. Coffin, B.A., pastor of the church here; there also took part in the service Messrs. Dugald Arch Munn, Mr. Fleet of the Nfld. Highlanders, Major W. H. Parsons, R.A.M.C., all of St. John's, and the G.W.V.A. The ex-service men under command of Flight-Lieut. A. E. Parsons, R.A.F., and Lieut. R. B. LeDrew occupied the front pews, as also did the Boy Scouts. Miss McRae presided at the organ all through the service in a very effective and able manner, a full choir being in attendance. With an organ prelude the service opened, and after two hymns had been sung and the Scripture Lesson read (Rev. 7, 9-17) there followed an anthem by the choir, "He giveth his beloved sleep," which was effectively rendered. After which came the address by the Rev. R. J. Power, M.A., of St. Andrew's, St. John's, and was indeed a fine one, most interesting and impressive, such as could not leave a hearer unmoved, but must have filled one and all with a greater desire for service—to do something higher and nobler than the commonplace things of life. The preacher referred to our soldier and sailor boys who were mere lads at the call of duty, left their books, colleges, offices, shops, boats and various other places to go and face the German hordes, who were men trained into the arts of war, but mere lads though they were, have helped to win a glorious victory for us and for those who shall come after us, and have beaten the Germans at their own game. True, many of them have passed out of the sight of men, but "Their names liveth for ever," and, as the Rev. Mr. Power said, not only their names, but they themselves, liveth for ever more and that by their death it does not imply that they are lost, but that there has only been a change—a cessation from earthly service—for they have entered into a fuller life, a grander life, one full of activities and of greater service. He spoke in words of comfort to those bereft of their dear ones by the cruel war, saying that the soldier boy does not cease to live, to love, to serve, but is only exalted to a higher realm.

One would conjure up the thought of a Memorial Service as a place of sadness yes, but of grief mingled with pride, when we meet to honor and commemorate the memory of the "fallen brave," there is something that thrills one, a feeling that cannot be expressed. For, truly, may we say—

"They are not dead, the soldier and the sailor,
Fallen for Freedom's sake;
They merely sleep, with faces that are paler,
Until they awake."

And, to those who came back, said the preacher, having gone out to the battlefields, not knowing whether it would be theirs to return or not, just as freely gave they themselves to King and Country, as those who shall never return, and we must, therefore, always show them all honor, respect and gratitude at all times and places. We may say Rev. Mr. Power's three brothers served in the Great War, two of whom made the Supreme Sacrifice, and the other bears the marks of the conflict and will all his life.

After the address, as above referred to, Rev. Mr. Coffin read the list of the honor roll, as follows:—

Capt. Grant Paterson, M.C., First Nfld. Regt.; Lance-Opl. A. E. Parsons, First Nfld. Regt.; Capt. W. H. Parsons, M.C., R.A.M.C.; Private James M. Cron, First Nfld. Regt.; Sergt. Graham Duff, 2nd Siege Battery, C.E.F.; Private J. Maxwell Cron, First Nfld. Regt.; Sergt. Probationer Ian M. Thompson, H.M.S. "Strongbow"; Nursing Sisters Maise Parsons, Frances Cron, Flora Makinson.

Of these, two made the Supreme Sacrifice, Private James Matthew Cron, who was killed in action April 14, 1917, and Sergt. Graham Duff, killed in action April 27, 1918.

After the singing of the Hymn, "O God of love, O King of Praise," the very important part of the service followed. Assisted by the Ministers and others, Mr. Dugald Munn unveiled the Memorial Tablet, which was covered by the Union Jack and gave a short appropriate speech; the plaintive notes of the Last Post resounding through the church and sounded by Bugler L. Taylor of Carbonar, could then be heard and when this was silenced Rev. Power's voice rose in a very beautiful dedicatory prayer, after which Mr. Dugald Munn, representing himself and family, and Mr. Arch Munn, representing St. Andrew's Church, St. John's, placed wreaths at the base of the Tablet; a bag-pipe lament played by Mr. Fleet of the Nfld. Highlanders followed, and was indeed most impressive. Mr. and

Mrs. Riggs of Carbonar then sang a duet, "Thy will be done" and the next silence was broken by the solemn strains of the Dead March in Saul, while all stood with bowed heads. Some very appropriate Scripture sentences were read by Rev. Coffin and the most impressive solo, Tennyson's "Crossing the Bar" was very beautifully rendered by Miss Thompson. Bugler Taylor then sounded the Reveille, after which came the National Anthem, which was heartily sung by all Rev. Power having pronounced the Benediction, on the strains of the postlude "Hallelujah Chorus" pealing forth from the organ, the Memorial Service came to a close, and we feel sure the gathering dispersed with the one thought, "it was good to be there."

The Tablet was manufactured by Birks and Sons, Montreal and is of bronze. It was placed on the pulpit and bears the following inscription:—

EXAMINATIONS TO BE HELD IN ST. JOHN'S.

Negotiations are being made between the Hon. W. W. Halfyard, Minister of Posts and Telegraphs and the Canadian Naval Department, Ottawa, whereby Canadian wireless examinations will be held in this city for first class commercial operators. This should solve the problem of the "Newfoundland Provisional License" which has caused great dissatisfaction, owing to it not being recognized by any other countries. It is expected that the first examination will be held early in the New Year.

Norwegian Liner Due.

S.S. Stavangerfjord, a large passenger boat belonging to the Norwegian American Line is due here to-morrow according to a wireless message received by the Reid Newfoundland Co. last evening. The ship is short of bunker and will take on board about 400 tons at this port. The Stavangerfjord is a sister ship of the Kristianfjord lost near Cape Race during the war. She was built in 1917 at Birkenhead by Messrs. Cammell Laird and Company, and is 13,500 tons gross. It is understood the ship is bound out from England, and is under charter to the C.P.R.

German Marks and American "Gamblers."

"Gamblers and nothing else," is one newspaper's description of Americans who have invested in German marks hoping to reap a rich harvest upon the return of German money to the normal exchange level. Speculation in foreign currency bonds, foreign currencies, bills of exchange and deposits of money in foreign banks, declares Mr. Thomas B. Pratt in The Annalist, has reached proportions "far beyond that of any similar craze for all stocks, gold mining or railroad shares, in the palest days of gambling in such ventures." It has reached every class in the population of the United States, "the corporation executive, the clerk, the farmer, the laborer, professional men and women of all classes have succumbed to the arguments and propaganda of the distributors of foreign currency 'investments.' And the speculation, we read, 'has been all the more insidious because of the plausible arguments that have been advanced about the profits that might be realized when these currencies return to normal or par.' Of course there has been no actual fraud in connection with this business.

Washed Up By the Ocean.
