FOUR ITALIANS ARE GUILTY OF CHARGE OF SHOOTING

Jury Finds That Two Did Actual Bodily Harm While the Other Two Assembled for that Purpose on Sunday, Feb. 16 on Street in Riverside

SENTENCE WILL BE PRONOUNCED LATER

Case Arose From the Desire for a Drink on Sunday, One of the Four Being Suspected of Being in League With License Inspectors.

The first verdict of guilty by a jury at the present session of the criminal court was returned yesterday afternoon when four Italians were convicted, two of doing bodily harm and the other two of assembling to do bodily harm. This was the last jury trial of the session, and the four were informed by His Honor Judge Black that they might return home. The first guilty men whose sentence will be pronounced by his honor, he having held the matter over to find out about the records and antecedents of the men, are Jim Marketto, Guy Martullo, Enzo Carona, and Sam Sereno. They were accused of attempting to murder Bernardo Sposto on February 8, a Sunday. There was some magnificent gunplay among the band, and Sposto, who, for some reason or other put in no appearance in court, is alive to tell the tale or not to tell, as he likes to do, only by some miracle. Four bullets entered his body in the fight, one in the forehead, the second in the left hip, the third in the right hip, and the fourth in the left arm. He would have proved a useful witness in the case, but he skipped the court. However, a verdict was secured without his aid.
