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Chicago Race Men Are Doing Well

Chicago, July—The wealth of Col- ored Chicagoans is difficult to estim- ate, because of the diversity of popu- lation, and the welcoming of their bus- iness by the big downtown banks, no exact tab can be made on bank de- posits. Experts, however, claim that Colored Chicagoans have more than \$20,000,000,000 on deposit in various banks of Chicago.

Official reports of five South Side banks, where a majority of the people live, and a large portion of the bus- iness is Colored, this week give com- bined resources of more than \$9,000, 000. Two of these banks are Col- ored, with resources as follows; Douglass National Bank, Anthony Overton, President, \$646,536.57; Bin- ga State Bank, Jesse Binga, Presid- ent, \$976,940.58.

The Binga State Bank has bought property at what is generally known here as the "Centre of the World," Thirty-fifth and State Streets, and is preparing to erect an exclusive Bank building to cost practically \$200,000.

Ball of Toronto, and a sister of Rev. R. R. Ball of Zion Church, Hartford, Conn. She was a junior member of the Famous Ball Family of Jubilee Singers.
