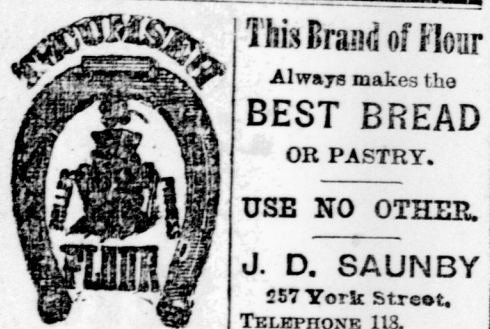

—Mr. Charles Dreaney, nephew of Ald. Dreaney, East London, has returned to British Columbia, where his father has secured a new salmon cannery establishment at Nanaimo Harbor, 300 miles from Victoria.

Owing to the success of the meetings and popularity of the hour, the London Hunt hounds will meet until further notice at the Kennels every Wednesday morning at 7 o'clock sharp. They will also meet every Saturday afternoon at 4 o'clock at the Kennels.

—The L. E. and D. R. Company have completed negotiations with the owners of the magnificent steamer Douglass to ply between Port Stanley and Cleveland this summer. She is larger and faster than the Lakeside, and is being repainted and fitted throughout.

—The Robin Hood Drill Corps of East London has ordered a costly bannerette from Geo. Tutill, a London, Eng., artist who makes a specialty of such work. It is expected to arrive before May 24, and if expectations are realized an exhibition drill will be given on the pavement at Dundas and Richmond streets. The corps has attained considerable fame, and is now in communication with a committee having in hand the arrangements for the meeting of the Subsidiary High Court of Central America, held in September at Meriden, Conn. If suitable terms strong, will attend.

REV. G. W. WYE'S CASE.

A Kingston telegram says: Richard Bayly, Q.C., counsel for the respondents in the Wye case, deliberated upon by the Ecclesiastical Court of Appeal, concluded his argument yesterday afternoon. His assistant counsel, Mr. Betts, completed that side of the case, and Mr. Marsh, on behalf of the appellant replied. The judgment will be delivered tomorrow. Counsel for the prosecution argued that the real question was whether Mr. Wye's usefulness was gone, not as a result of his fault, but from any cause whatsoever. If this was found to be a fact, then the canon required his removal. Mr. Bayly held that Mr. Wye's services were not acceptable, that out of 305 communications not more than 50 or so attended the services. Mr. Bayly dealt with the aspersions cast on the Diocesan Commission and the chancellor, and showed that they had not acted with other than conscientious integrity in the work—they had done a disagreeable duty with faithfulness and sagacity.

WILL BE BUILT.

The Hudson Bay Railroad—The Contract Let.

Winnipeg, May 3.—Mr. Hugh Sutherland, accompanied by Messrs. Grant, Foley and Isbister, the contractors of the Hudson Bay road, left Portage la Prairie early yesterday by carriage and will drive over the entire route northward to Lake Dauphin. A local engineer is now engaging a staff of men and it is said that engineers will take the field next week. Two parties will likely be sent out, one starting from this end of the line, and the other beginning near Westbourne and working towards Lake Dauphin. According to present plans the first section to be graded will extend from a point on the old line to the neighborhood of Portage la Prairie.

Mr. Andrew Strang, secretary of the Hudson Bay Railway, was seen yesterday. Mr. Strang said that on Wednesday Mr. Sutherland, president, Mr. Sprague, a director, and himself, met and officially ratified the contract to build the first 250 miles of the Hudson Bay Railway, which was signed by the contractors and president. The directors found everything, from start to finish, in proper legal shape, and the contract was ratified and signed by the directors in the presence of the contractors. The order-in-council is attached to the contract. The contractors bind themselves to build 250 miles, one-half of it this year and the other half next, while the company bind themselves regarding the payments.

HEADLIGHT FLASHES.

The Michigan Central's report for the year ended Dec. 31, shows gross earnings of \$12,584,013; expenses and taxes, \$9,144,906. The directors were re-elected. Chicago dispatch states that Christian Endeavor tickets for the Boston meeting will be sold July 10 to 14, and limited to July 22, by eastern lines. One fare will be charged if the same route is used both ways. Otherwise, the rate will be 60 per cent of both local rates.

Advices to railroad officials in Chicago are to the effect that at Wednesday's meeting of executive officers of trunk lines and the Grand Trunk and C. P. R. roads in New York it was decided to abolish all excessive commissions on immigrant traffic via the Canadian Pacific from all Atlantic ports after May 15.
