A Sick Horse.

To the Editor of the ADVERTISER: I have a horse 5 years old, on whose hind leg a swelling suddenly appeared. The whole limb from the body to the hoof is swollen. He is also troubled with worms, and has a ravenous appetite. Kindly say in your valuable columns what treatment you would advise and what you think has caused the swelling. R. D. McLEOD.

[Ans.-Your horse has lymphangitis. Give him a dose of purgative medicine (Aloes, 7 or 8 drams, according to the size of the horse), bathe the leg well with hot water and apply a good stimulating liniment afterwards. Give him one dram of saltpetre every night in feed, and give him exercise every day. For the worms, after he gets better of the swelled leg, you might give him every night two drams of sulphate iron in his feed and turn him on grass. 1

Found Guilty of Heresy by the Guelph Conference.

But Given Opportunity to Renounce His Objectionable Views.

Superannuations Agreed to-New Blood for the Work of the Ministry.

Goderich, May 31.-The matter of min-

isterial character and doctrine was inquired into, the only case requiring special consideration being that of Rev. Nelson Burns, M.A., and this in the matter of doctrinal teaching. Charges having been preferred by Rev. Mr. Nugent, a committee was appointed to investigate them, the result being that the charges were sustained. It was, therefore, on motion of Rev. Dr. Griffin, seconded by Rev. D. Willoughby, resolved that the charges against the Rev. Nelson Burns, M.A., for holding and propagating doctrines which are contrary to our articles of religion and doctrinal standards having been fully sustained, the only course open to us is that he be deposed from the ministry of our church. Nevertheless, this penalty shall not be enforced until the last day of the present session of conference, and not then if in the meantime he shall, to the satisfaction of the conference, retract his erroneous views and avow himself in full accord with Methodist doctrines and usages.

Following are the charges: Charge 1. He holds and teaches that the Holy Scriptures are nonessential; he impugns and discredits the Word of God, and affirms that it is not the only rule and the sufficient both of our faith and practice.

Charge 2. He holds and teaches a view of Jesus Christ which makes his divinity practically nonessential, and while declining to declare his accord with the view of the divinity of Christ held by the Methodist Church, he has assailed that view. Charge No. 3. He holds and teaches as the essential of the Gospel the fanatical

doctrine that a Christian may and should know the will of God in all things affecting him exclusively by the direct revelation and guidance of the Spirit as well as Christ or the Apostles knew it, and repudiates all other guides. Charge 4. He ignores the leading doc. trines of Methodism, treating them as nonessential and declaring in substance that his theory of guidance is the whole Gospel. He asserts the insufficiency of Wesley's teaching and example because it did not include this tanatical doctrine; also declares that Methodism has no satisfactory answer to the crucial problem as to how to live right. He asperses the sincerity and

THE FRASER FLOOD

Likely To Be More Disastrous Than That of 1882.

The Whole Valley Under Water-Many Families Rendered Hemeless.

VANCOUVER, B. C., May 31.—The Fraser River is still rising, and the indications are that the flood will be even more disastrous than the memorable one of 1882. The river is already within eight inches of the high water mark of that great inundation. The whole valley is under water, the Fraser having spread out into a vast lake. The tide is now crawling up at the rate of an inch every three hours.

At Westminster the river wharves are submerged. Many cabins along the water front have floated off on the tide and many poor families have lost all their belongings. Points further up the river report that the danger increases. At Nicomen Island 44 fine farms are entirely under water. In the vicinity of Ruby Creek the greatest danger is apparent, and several steam. ers have been dispatched to the district,

Annacis Island, two miles above New Westminster, is totally submerged, ruining many fine farms which formerly dotted the island. The ranchers were rescued by steamboats, but all their stock has been

AMATEUR AERONAUT DROWNED.

Isaac Alder Drops With a Parachute Into the Ohio River. CINCINNATI, June 1 .- Isaac Alder lost his life in a foolhardy attempt to become an aeronaut. A picnic was given at Manhattan Beach, a resort five miles down the river on the Ohio side, and Master Eddy Hill, a professional aeronaut from Staten Island, N. Y., had been advertised to make a balloon ascension and parachute drop. The balloon was inflated and everything was in readiness, when Hill declined to make the assension on account of the bad weather. Adler, who had attended the picnic with her mother and sister, slipped away from them and, edging his way through the crowd, volunteered to go up. Hill advised him not to attempt it, but Alder was determined, and, seizing hold of the parachute bar, called on the crowd to cut loose. Some one cut the rope and

the balloon shot up, with Adler holding on. When fully 1,000 feet above the earth Adler released the parachute and came down.
