Bismarck Given a Grand Reception in Berlin

Upon His Arrival to Make Up with the Emperor-Cheering Crowds.

BERLIN, Jan. 26 .- At 9:10 this morning six Friedrichsruhe ladies, dresses in white, proceeded to the castle and presented to Prince Bismarck a large laurel wreath bound with ribbons and bearing the inscription "A Happy Journey." Bismarck was attired in a cuirassier's uniform, over which he wore a fur coat. He was accompanied by Princess Bismarck and several friends. Six girls led the way to the station strewing flowers, whence he was to embark for Berlin to meet the Emperor for the first time since their estrangement four

years ago. The cheering and salutations from the crowd that had gathered to witness his entry into Berlin evidently pleased him very much. He smiled in response to the cries of welcome, and saluted the crowd frequently. The route from the monument of Frederick the Great to the palace gates was lined with members of the Veteran Guards, firemen, unions and turners' societies. Most of the houses along the route were decorated with flags. The entire population of Berlin was swelled by thousands of people from all parts of Germany, who had apparently turned out to welcome the return of the Prince, and the younger element in crowds cheered themselves hoarse as the State coach passed along.
