LOSS, THREE MILLIONS.

Minneapolis, Minn., June 8.—An area in the middle of the city tour blocks wide and ten long is a blackened plain of ashes with not a single building standing. A conservative estimate of the loss is \$5,000,000, not one-quarter insured. James Flynn, the son of a city alderman, is reported burned, also three other children. Photographer Gilbert and an unknown man are reported lost. Practically only one hotel and only one restaurant were left in town.

The fire started through hot ashes being thrown behind the Sun restaurant.
