

In concluding, Col. Culver said that he felt the time was fast approaching when western civili-

ness, vice-principal of the London Normal School, announced that he was going to be very short. In fact, he said, it was quite impossible for him to be anything else. He liked the way in which the toast had been received, and spoke very highly of the faculty and undergraduates. He felt that they had no superiors in any preceding classes, and he felt he was right in saying that though small in numbers, they had more than carried their share of honors. Western University graduates were coming to the front everywhere. He knew of one who was mayor, one who was on a school board and one who was in the House of Parliamene. It was possible that some poor students had been turned out of the university, but there certainly had been a great many good ones. All students received the same kind of training, but the results were sometimes different. Another point that he made in the course of his speech was the advantage that the students ought to reap from the fact that the classes were small.
