## POLICE CORRAL DESPERATE GANG

**Toronto Detectives Round Down** Men Believed to Have Made Sensational Gem Steal.

Toronto, Dec. 25 .- Joseph Warren, 25 Center avenue; John Warren, 25 Center avenue; John Milligan, 4 Leonard avenue; Fred Marsh, 77 Nelson street With the arrest of the foregoing men the police say that the sensational robbery of Mr. David Ward's loan office at 104 Adelaide street east on Saturday

night was cleared up. Milligan was taken in a hard chase after the robbery, and Marsh and John Warren on Monday morning. Joseph Warren was placed under arrest early this morning at his home, 25 Center

Marsh has been employed at Front street hotel as a handy man, and John Warren as assistant engineer. Milligan also worked at the hotel, bu Joseph Warren is said to have been

without steady employment. If the information in the possession of the authorities is correct the robbery at the loan office is only one of a number planned in the fall of 1905. It is singular that the big Lugsdin fur robbery took place just a year ago Christmas eve. Milligan and John Warren were tried on the charge, but owing to the lack of identification were

acquitted. The Moneypenny warehouse, where John Warren worked as engineer, was also on the list of places slated for robbery.

The detectives assert that they are now in full possession of the details of

the robbery. They believe that Joseph Warren arranged at the Wilson livery, Yonge street, on Dec. 10, for the horse and on the night of Saturday, Dec. 15, drove down to the Ward loan office, and after laying out their plans concluded that it would not be safe to go through the job with only himself, his brother John, and Milligan,

They wanted a fourth man, and it is alleged that Marsh when approached consented to join them in the daring robbery.

The night of the raid it is alleged that Joseph Warren and Milligan got the horse and cutter at Wilson's, and, driving downtown, picked up the other Warren and Marsh on Adelaide. The scoria block thrown through the window was obtained at the new Rich. mond street loop. Marsh, the police say, sat in the cutter; Joseph Warren

threw the stone block: Jack Warren held the door, and Milligan grabbed for the precious stone. After the robbery the detectives assert that Milligan and Marsh drove off in the sleigh and the two Warrens

gienic state of the province. The Government cannot find room for all he revolutionists made prisoners. A new jail for "politicals" is to be made out of throwers were executed. Casemates formerly occupied by big guns, with walls of mmense thickness, will be used as cells.

It is believed that the official figures, according to which more than 30,000 persons charged with political offences have been deported to Siberia during the past twelve months without trial, refer exclusively to deportations for such political offences as are recognized by the legal code, otherwise the numbers would have to be multiplied tenfold. Nearly an equal number of prisoners are known to have lost their lives during the same period.

It is stated that 300,000 persons are at this moment either in prison on political charges or proceeding to exile, while the number of those who have already reached Siberia or other places of deportation con prises about 200,000.
