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BARRIE TO PLEAD

Novelist To Present Petition To Abolish Play Censor.

London, Nov. 20.—Agitation over the censorship of plays still continues just why, nobody seems to know, unless it is the agitators, and they do not explain it very clearly.

What strikes one as being rather odd is that when the petition is presented to the Prime Minister next week asking for the abolition of the censor, Mr. J. M. Barrie is to be the spokesman.

Why Barrie? He has never written a play that has been censored, and it is not believed that he ever will. If there is any dramatist in England who has no quarrel with a censor it is Mr. Barrie.

It is noticed that Mr. Pinero, of dancing doll fame; Mr. Henry Arthur Jones and Mr. Alfred Sutro, of problem play fame, do not come to the front and center in this movement to any marked degree, but it is left to the author of the innocuous and nursery room story of "Peter Pan" to demand the privilege to give immoral plays.

VALUES LOVE AT \$1,500,000

Coachman-Husband of New York Belle Sues for Alienation.

Newport, R. I., Nov. 20.—Stating that he had brought three suits, each of \$500,000, against those whom he charged with alienating the affections of his wife, formerly Mrs. Burke-Roche, and also with conspiracy against him, Aurel Batonyi made a flying visit to Newport today. He said also that he had come to seek an interview with Mrs. Batonyi, but that in this he had been unsuccessful.

Mr. Batonyi said that he had brought one suit against Frank K. Sturgis, former partner of Frank Work, Mrs. Batonyi's father, whom he charged with alienating the affections of his wife. Another suit, he stated, had been brought against Mr. Work, also for alienating the affections of Mrs. Batonyi, and the third, in which the charge is conspiracy to separate him and his wife, had been brought jointly against Frank Work, J. H. Work, Mr. Sturgis and Mr. and Mrs. Peter Cooper Hewitt, the latter Mrs. Batonyi's sister. These suits, Mr. Batonyi said, had been entered in New York.

Mr. Batonyi said that he had also brought two suits against his wife. One was a counter action for divorce, another was to recover two horses, furniture, carriages, harness and pictures which were at Two-Mile Corner Farm, near Newport, where Mr. and Mrs. Batonyi made their home.

Mr. Batonyi claimed that he and his wife were several months ago offered \$24,000 a year by Mr. and Mrs. Hewitt and Mr. Sturgis if they would leave the country and reside abroad. He showed a letter dated Aug. 18 last, which he said was a copy of one he had sent J. H. Work declining the offer. This money, Mr. Batonyi said, was to come out of the estate of Frank Work.

The former estimate was 110 square miles. The result will be beneficial to the canal, as the greater quantity of water stored up will allow of 56 lockages a day instead of only 26, the former estimate.
