Children May Have a Longer Holiday

It is not unlikely that the children of Lorne avenue school will have a longer holiday than is usual this year for the work of rebuilding the building is but well started, and the school will not be ready for occupation by the time of the regular opening in September.

A meeting of the board of education will be called this week to discuss the question and decide on what course to take.

The front section of the school was torn down after the school closed, about July 1, and the contractor has not had time to finish the work.

Several of the rooms may be opened, but there are many objections to such a course, as it would be dangerous to have children around where the work is going on.

The new heating plant has been installed at Chesley avenue school and it is a great improvement on the old hot air system. The temperature was at the freezing point in the school many times last winter, and it was therefore found necessary to put in a new plant.

A RUNAWAY IN SOUTH LONDON

Bad Condition of the Roads Said To Be Responsible.

The condition of Wootley road between Elmwood avenue and Bruce street was responsible for a small runaway yesterday afternoon, which nearly resulted in a local painter receiving serious injury.

He was driving north with a wagon full of ladders and other parts of his outfit, when the horse became frightened at the noise of the bouncing wagon and ladders.

About thirty feet apart along the block are bumps nearly a foot high, and as the wagon struck these, the driver was finding it difficult to hold his seat.

He was clinging to the edge of the seat and trying to stop the horse, when a pedestrian came to his assistance and succeeded in quieting the animal.

Beyond having to gather up his outfit, which had been distributed along the road, the painter was none the worse.

CATHCART ST. IS BEING IMPROVED

Was in Bad Shape After the Sewer Had Been Completed.

Cathcart street, between Elmwood avenue and Bruce street, is being put into better shape by the corporation men.

The road was dug up for a sewer recently, and as a result it was in very bad condition when the work was completed.

The ground was of clay, and when the earth was being put back into the trench it was found that much could not be packed in. The road was consequently left in ridges where the main trench and the side drains were put in.

The road is now being plowed up, and it will be leveled over and rolled. At times during the wet weather this summer it was almost impossible to go over the road.

A London Invitation.
Resolutions from subordinate courts were presented and the hours of meeting then named.

Bro. John H. Hamblin at this juncture presented the invitation of the reception committee from the London and the committee on the coming of this evening. In so doing he referred to the fact that it was in London Independent Forestry saw its birth, and that it had ever since been a city where the order had prospered.

His worship then extended the welcome of the city, and as a representative of the city, and as a brother Forester. He recalled his initiation twenty-two years ago, when the late S. C. R. Dr. Oronhyatekha presided. Of the five aldermen who received the highest vote in the city, four were members of the I. O. F. His worship referred to the I. O. R., and when Court Hope No. 1, the first order, had been instituted, Middlesex was the birthplace, too, of the present S. C. R. He gave them all a most hearty welcome. His worship was enthusiastically applauded.

"London is the old homestead of the I. O. F.," was the way Ald. Ferguson expressed it, and he added warm words of welcome that were likewise applauded.

Ex-Mayor Essery.
Ex-Mayor Essery was also delighted to add his welcome. As president of the National Fraternal Congress, he represented the 900,000 fraternalists in Canada, he extended greetings as the Canadian Order of Chosen Friends, he also conveyed their best wishes, and as representative of the Orange Order, too, he welcomed the I. O. F.

No soldier or sailor in the Empire had done as great work as the people in the fraternal orders were engaged in today. Poorhouses, he said, were many in the old country; here there was no need for them, and he paid an eloquent tribute to the fraternal societies, which he said, put Canada 1,000 years ahead of other countries. The result was the best men and women in the world.

Fraternal Greetings.
Vice High Chancellor of the Royal Arcanum, J. A. Cottam, extended fraternal greetings from the council of his order. He bore testimony to the great work being done by the I. O. F., and he said it was always a pleasure to extend fraternal greetings between sister societies. He spoke of the work of co-operation as compared with the work of trusts and big corporations. The fraternal work, he declared, was going to have an effect on the race. The Royal Arcanum knew what the experience of raising rates was, and he complimented the I. O. F. on its recent action, which he said would redound to all the community.

Praise for London.
Past High Chief Ranger Goodman, of Cayuga, congratulated the mayor on presiding over such a beautiful city as London. He also referred to the growth of Independent Forestry since its inception in this city. He thanked the civic deputation for their kind words.

High Secretary Henderson said the 20,000 members of Western Ontario appreciated the fraternal spirit shown by the sister societies. The broadness shown was appreciated and was an encouragement to them, and Dr. Henderson made an eloquent reference to

the work of fraternalism, and assured the sister societies they had the best wishes and goodwill of the I. O. F. They felt honored that they were meeting where High Chief Ranger Darch, who had been such an able officer, dwelt, and where there were so many associations with the progress of Independent Forestry.

Following the applause of the high secretary's eloquence, the deputation retired, the members of the high court expressing their goodwill by singing: "For He's a Jolly, Good Fellow."

The court then adjourned until this afternoon.

Advance In Rates Discussed Today

Foresters Hear the Arguments

One Delegate Says Fraternal Insurance Must Not Be Interfered With.

He spoke briefly on the advance in rates and asked for the loyal support of all the members. In the past there had been extravagance, but expenses had been cut down, and he showed how money was being saved by ceasing work in Australia and some other countries.

Changes in I. O. F.
Bro. MacGillivray recited the changes in the I. O. F., and spoke of the inadequacy of the rates that had been charged. Since the rates were increased in 1899, 155,000 members had joined the I. O. F., which showed that they did not regard the rates as too high. It was later found that there was an inequitable assessment of members, and what the old members were paying was inadequate. This Oronhyatekha had recognized shortly before his death. Bro. MacGillivray then spoke of bringing in the new insurance bill, and the successful opposition of the S. C. R. in order to prevent the I. O. F. being put out of business. Following that, the supreme court had been called at as early a date as possible. Then a committee of 25 members from all jurisdictions had taken up the matter. There had been only one opinion in that committee—that something had to be done to make the rates equitable. Naturally, there was a difference of opinion as to the remedy. A few wished actuarial rates, others went to the other extreme, and wished only present schedule, while the middle course between these two was favored among the committee.

The matter came before the supreme court, was thrashed out, and became the law of the order, and which it was the duty of every loyal Forester and Companion to carry out.

The address was still going on at 2:30.

Supreme Secretary Speaks.
Supreme Secretary R. Matheson expressed the regret at the inability of Supreme Chief Ranger Stevenson to be present. He, however, represented the supreme council. Bro. Matheson referred to the fact that he had spent six happy years in the order, and he had been an officer at the asylum.

Hotelmen Paid the Sum of \$509.85 More Old Boys' Week Cases Dealt With

One man paid up yesterday. Altogether, as a result of the proceedings, Mr. Moule gathered in \$509.85, which is going some, and doing a good business.

Tramps Dealt With.
Magistrate Love believes in breaking up gangs of tramps, and J. H. Jarvis, James Gallagher, of Montreal, and J. Thibault, of Rochester, who were gathered in at the C. P. R. yards last night, were told that they could not be liberated together.

Jarvis, who says he has a wife and family in Toronto, was allowed to go today.

Gallagher will be released on Friday, and Thibault will be let go next week.

Assault Case.
Emma Hackett, a colored woman, pleaded guilty to assaulting Levi Cochran, and was bound over in the sum of \$100 to keep the peace.

Case Adjourned.
The case of Dan Carroll and Frank McLean, charged with assaulting Joseph R. Wilson, and occasioning actual bodily harm, was adjourned until Sept. 9, and bail was taken for the appearance of Carroll and McLean in the sum of \$50 each.

Wilson alleges that he was injured very seriously while being ejected from the barroom of the Duke of York Hotel by Messrs. McLean and Carroll.
