CIVIC FEDERATION IS NOW ORGANIZED

Mr. Geo. C. Gibbons, K. C., Was Chosen as the First President.

CONSTITUTION ADOPTED

Committees Named for the Year—Functions of Each Committee Are Defined.

The organization of the Civic Federation was completed in the city hall last night, and Mr. Geo. C. Gibbons, K. C., was selected as the first president.

These officers were elected by the meeting after Capt. T. J. Murphy read a report of the committee, in which he stated that these officers had been chosen for their respective places by the committee. Mr. Murphy read the history of the movement in the city, and predicted a great sphere of usefulness if the members took a deep interest in its affairs.

The Constitution. Rev. J. G. Inkster read a tentative constitution, and on motion of Mr. Alex. McQueen, the executive committee was empowered to amend it as occasion demanded.

A short informal discussion took place on the formation of the association in London, and the opinion was expressed that a great deal of good could be accomplished by the federation.

KING GEORGE FIFTH IS BUSY MONARCH

Every Minute of His Time Occupied With Affairs of State.

London, May 11.—King George today has been one of the busiest men in the empire. From morning until night every minute of his time was occupied in state business or in superintending the arrangements for his father's funeral.

His most important engagement today was with the privy council, at which the cabinet members renewed their official oath, and alterations in the liturgy of the Church of England, necessitated by the change in sovereignty, were ordained. These show that "Queen-Mother" is to be Alexandra's future title. The King previously gave an audience to Prime Minister Asquith, and he received various officials throughout the day. The remainder of his time was spent in his own office in Marlborough House, examining and discussing arrangements for the funeral and for the entertainment of the royal guests.

Queen Mary is doing her utmost not to allow the loss of her grand-father to overshadow the lives of the young children of King Edward, and much of them. He often told them stories and joined in their games, and they have the happiest recollections of him. Their mother wants them to retain these memories.

BALLOON COLLAPSED

Two American Aeronauts Badly Injured in Race After Record.

Glasgow, Ky., May 11.—Bearing numerous cuts and bruises, and possibly internal injuries, and with only occasional periods of consciousness, A. Holland Forbes, of New York, holder of the Lahm trophy, and J. C. Yates, a New York astronomer, who accompanied him in a flight against the balloon distance record, are lying in a farmhouse six miles north of Centre, which is about 20 miles from this city. The balloon with which they ascended at Quincy, Ill., is a mass of tangled silk and cord, torn beyond repair.

During the intervals when the aeronauts were partially conscious neither of them could explain the accident yet, but it is thought that gas escaping from the big bag caused them to lose control of the balloon, and that the gas escaped until a drop followed.

The balloon was first sighted south of Centre about 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon. Those who saw it could not distinguish the passengers and expected that something was wrong. It moved over Centre, and appeared to be moving toward the ground, when the bag suddenly collapsed and the dash to the ground was fearful.

MINNEHAHA FLOATED. Houghton, St. Marys, Seilly Islands, May 11.—The Atlantic transport liner Minnehaha was floated today and proceeded under her own steam to Crow Sound to the south of the island, where she anchored. The steamer will be examined by divers.

The Minnehaha went ashore near Bishop Rock during the night of April 17. Her passengers and crew escaped, but much of the cargo was lost, and for a time it was feared that the steamer would be a complete loss.
