To Bury "L'Algon" in France.

Paris, Nov. 16.—The time when the recent marriage of Prince Victor Bonaparte is attracting attention. It is now known that the body of the late Prince will be taken to France for burial here. One of the leaders in the movement to bring "L'Algon" back to the land of his famous sire, is M. Quentin Bauchant, a member of the municipal council of Paris, who has enlisted the sympathy of Rostand.

In an open letter to Quentin Bauchant, the "L'Algon" says it would be a noble thing for France to have this body of the "poor child," but he doubts if it would be a claim to it, would relinquish possession.

It is believed that this letter from the "L'Algon" will be taken up by the Government, with the result that her body will be taken to France and made the necessary overtures themselves.

Paris is manifesting great interest in the wedding on Monday last of Prince Victor Napoleon, the Imperialist pretender to the French throne, and Prince

Clementine of Belgium, at Montecarlo, Italy, near Turin. When the news was published in Paris, the printed forms which the law requires to be posted in certain places, were edited by the Imperial censor, who deprived Victor of his Imperial titles, although granting her royal title to Clementine.

In an interview with Jean d'Orsay, a widely-known French politician, writer, Prince Victor barred politics as a topic of conversation, and there was no talk about his ambitions, but at the close of the interview he made use of a phrase which was widely repeated here.

"Belgium was invented," said Prince Victor, speaking of his home in Brussels, France not to be too much afraid of her exile.

DEAD MAN'S STORY AGAINST DEFENCE

The Lawyers Ask That It Be Excluded From Evidence

[Special to The Advertiser.]

L'Original, Nov. 16.—The trial of Alfred Blondin for the shooting of Dr. Empey, goes on again this afternoon. The proceedings yesterday were adjourned on account of an attempt made by the defence to introduce a statement of the dead man, excluded from the evidence.

Edmund Meredith, K.C., of London, in his address to the jury, hinted at jealousy as the cause of Blondin's act, in the shooting of Dr. Empey, on the day of the shooting gone to work. Dr. Empey's house for the first time in a mortem statement of the dead man, who declared that Blondin deliberately shot him at the moment when he was dying from medical attention.

The defence claims that the shooting was an accident, and seeks to bar the evidence of Dr. Empey's mortem statement on the evidence of Dr. McDougall and Dr. Vining, who were present at the dying man hypodermic injections of morphine. This, the defence claims, caused him to become clouded, and to cause him to make wild statements. The case is causing intense interest.

MISTAKES IN MESSAGES

Commission Trying to Fix Liability of Telegraph Companies.

Ottawa, Nov. 15.—The question of the telegraph companies' liability for proper delivery of messages came up before the railway commission today on application of the telegraph companies to discontinue business in Canada, before the end of their message forms. Hereafter, the telegraph companies should be themselves liable only to the amount of the penalty for the proper transmission of an ordinary message, and for 50 times the maximum liability of \$500. Representatives of the companies suggested that the maximum liability should be limited to \$200 for ordinary messages, and to \$400 for repeated messages. The board reserved its decision.

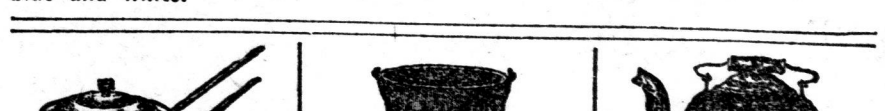
