JUDGMENT WAS RESERVED IN THE CITY HALL SALE CASE

**Judge Heard Argument
of Counsel and Will
Consider Case.**
**MARKET LOOMS
BIG IN CASE**

**Question Is Fought Out as to
Whether Land at Rear of
Hall Is Part of Square.**

Justice Middleton reserved his decision at the conclusion of the arguments of the counsel in the case of the sale of the City of London and the Royal Bank at the non-jury sessions of the high court this afternoon.

It is possible that a considerable period will elapse before judgment is rendered, as numerous statutes, parol evidence, and conveyances of market made, etc., to the city, with copies of bylaws and minutes of council proceedings concerning the matter in question, have been filed in court for the judge's guidance.

Sir George Gibbons.

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City Clerk Baker.
City Clerk Baker produced copies of the minutes of the council of the City of London, in which the city hall was offered for sale. No tenders were received at that time.

To Sir George Gibbons, the mayor stated that his idea concerning the size of the market square were embodied in a copy of his inaugural speech of this year, which was produced, showing that his worship stated at that time that he believed in enlargement of the square, but by some arrangement that would necessitate the increasing of the debt.

Justice Middleton, in closing his case, stated that he intended to call Aldermen Bennett and Donnelly, but these gentlemen were unable to be present.

The Plaintiff's Case.
Mr. Gibbons first took the ground that the council had no power to sell the land, as it was not theirs. He stated that the lands in question were purchased only for market purposes. The minutes of the council of Aug. 26, 1892, were also produced by Sir George, dealing with the purchase of the land on which the hall at present stands. Messrs. Barber, Culling, Anderson and others were prominent in the proceedings. A bylaw passed on March 3, 1893, provided for the borrowing of £20,000 for purposes of increasing the size of the market and for erecting a town hall. Sir George pointed out that the land on which the city hall stands is really the market as the town hall was, according to the old bylaw, erected upon the market.

Later, however, Justice Middleton pointed out the council apparently altered its opinion, and decided to use a portion of the land in that it was acquired for town hall purposes and enlarge in another direction.

The Arcade.
However, provision was made for the arcade from the beginning, and for that reason Sir George contended that the arcade is still in reality a portion of Covent Garden market.

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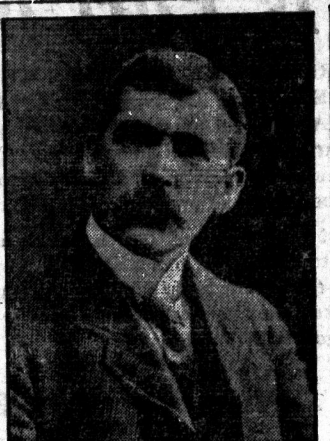

FINED \$5.00 FOR BLOCKING CROSSING

**P. M. Judd Says Next Man

Police Magistrate Judd began a crusade against all trainmen who are responsible for their trains blocking the city crossings, when in the police court today he fined Conductor Oswald Vansickle, of Toronto, the sum of \$5 for blocking the Burwell street crossing for 18 minutes on Nov. 8.

"This blocking of the city crossings has got to be stopped," said his worship, before imposing the fine on Mr. Vansickle. "You people know perfectly well that you cannot block these crossings for this length of time, and if you will insist upon doing it, you will have to take the consequences."

The Charge.
The charge against Vansickle arose out of a number of complaints that the city council has received in regard to the blocking of several crossings along the Grand Trunk.

The council notified the police department to get busy, and P. C. Bolton was detailed to watch the Grand Trunk crossings. On Nov. 8, Grand Trunk freight 422 blocked the Burwell street crossing for 18 minutes, and the council laid the information. Night Yardmaster O'Leary was the man who first summoned, but when he came up a week ago to answer the charge, he proved that he was not on duty that night.

One Case Dismissed.
Consequently the conductor in charge of the freight, and Yardmaster John J. Cloghessy were served with summonses. They appeared in court today. The charge against Cloghessy, however, was dismissed, as he proved that he was not responsible. It was then up to Mr. Vansickle and his two brakemen, who also appeared, to take the responsibility. It seems that two cars on the rear end of the train had to be shunted off into a siding.

SPRINGBANK PUMPS ARE IN A POOR STATE OF EFFICIENCY

**Professor Angus's Report Shows That City Was Not Getting
the Quantity of Water Which It Was Alleged Was
Being Pumped Each Day.**

Superintendent Glaubits, of the waterworks department, has received from Prof. Angus, of Toronto, the report of his inspection of the hydraulic pumps at Springbank. It substantiates what Mr. Glaubits has always contended that the pumps were not efficient.

According to Prof. Angus's figures, their average efficiency is but 87 per cent, when as a matter of fact they should run 95 per cent. The pumps were not in a good condition, and certain changes will have to be made to put them in good shape.

The report shows conclusively that we have not been getting the water from Springbank that we thought we were, said Mr. Glaubits. The average efficiency of the pumps is fixed at 87 per cent by Prof. Angus, instead of 95 as they should be.

THE THRUSTS OF SIR WILFRID PIERCE THE BODEN ARMOR

**New Administration Squirms Under Telling Attack of Liberal
Chieftain in Speech Debate—Naval Programme To Be
Abandoned, Announcement of the Premier.**

Ottawa, Nov. 20.—Whether the anti-imperial and anti-naval Nationalist element in the cabinet shall dominate the new administration in determining the one vital question raised by Sir Wilfrid Laurier in the Commons this afternoon. It was the first trial of debating strength between the new Opposition and the new Government, and the vulnerability of the Nationalist-Conservative cabinet was strikingly disclosed. It was Sir Wilfrid's seventieth birthday, and as a preliminary to the speeches from both Government and Opposition side graceful references were made to the occasion. That the passing years have but added to the "Old Chief's" vigor and skill as the master tactician of the Canadian Parliament was revealed in his clear-cut and effective dissection of the situation in which Mr. Borden finds himself. It was a powerful and statesmanlike arraignment, delivered in Sir Wilfrid's most finished style. The Opposition was visibly delighted and heartened, and the prophecies of embarrassment for the new Government from the start were amply borne out. Sir Wilfrid, ably seconded by Mr. Hugh Guthrie, pointed out in the succinct manner the problems the administration had to face, and which were emphasized rather than made easy by the result of the election. The defeat of the reciprocity agreement did not settle the question of the demand of the agriculturists of Canada for new markets, nor was an imperial preferential trade arrangement brought about by consummation by the bringing into power of a party pledged to high tariff.

Borden Evades.
But it was in dealing with the naval question that Mr. Borden's anomalous position was made most evident. Sir Wilfrid's amendment to the address in reply to the speech from the throne, restating the desire of the people of Canada to accept responsibilities of national defence, was coupled with a declaration that the present cabinet was composed of men holding diametrically opposite opinions, and consequently unfitted to evolve or carry out a national policy on this question of highest importance to the Dominion and to the empire. The new cabinet was compared by Sir Wilfrid to a Joseph's coat of many colors, and, casting out the simile, he asked which of the brethren had been betrayed, the imperialist or the anti-imperialist? Was it Ontario or Quebec that had been swallowed the Nationalist lamb, or has the Nationalist lamb swallowed the imperialist? Hon. Mr. Borden's reply, while evoking cheers from his followers, and clever in evading the direct issue, was in the last analysis practically only a delay. Give us time, he said, in effect, and we will formulate a policy, and when that policy is formulated we shall consult the people before it is finally adopted. Thus he holds out to Ontario the promise of doing something for naval defence, while at the same time he yields to the Nationalist demands for a referendum. To the thrusts of Sir Wilfrid's anent the composite character of his cabinet, he replied by a general denial that there was any dissension among them. The debate will be continued tomorrow.

Mover of Reply.
Mr. R. B. Bennett, the mover of the reply, having duly travelled the customary course of commendation of the subjects touched on in the speech from the throne, inserted into his vigorous address several more radical suggestions. He counselled the creation of a department of health, and that no private corporation should control or dominate the terminals of the Hudson Bay Railway. He also argued for the establishment of adequate terminals at Prince Rupert and

BILINGUAL SCHOOLS UNLAWFUL SAYS THE ATTORNEY-GENERAL

**In Statement Handed to the Press, Hon. Mr. Foy Declares That
No Language Other Than English Should Be Taught
in the Schools of Ontario.**

Toronto, Nov. 21.—Hon. J. J. Foy, attorney-general in the Whitney Administration, and candidate in North Toronto for re-election, declared himself with regard to the school question in Ontario at a meeting of the North Toronto Conservative Association held last night in Cumberland Hall.

Hon. Mr. Foy read and handed out to the press this carefully prepared statement.

"I desire to give my views on the question of the schools and to put them briefly and clearly to avoid imperfect reporting. I have written them down and will hand this to the press."

No Other Language.
"That no other language should be taught in these schools."

"That such is the law that should govern us."

"That there cannot lawfully be any bilingual schools in the Province of Ontario, and if any are found, they must cease to exist, and care should be taken to make all schools conform to the law."

"I wish to add that this policy is not one that is in the slightest way unfriendly to any portion of the community, but, on the contrary, is in the interest and for the benefit of each one of the rising generation. It will remove what would otherwise be a drag on many a youth in the race of life, and enable him to fairly compete with his fellow on an equal footing."

This statement was received with prolonged applause. Chairman George Stevenson then called upon Mr. W. K. McNaught, the other North Toronto candidate, who paid a tribute to the Liberal candidate, Mr. Joseph Oliver, and endorsed Mr. Foy's statement.

"With reference to the question of bilingual schools," said Mr. McNaught, "I stand where I have always stood. I agree with Mr. Foy. This is a British province. English is the language of Ontario. The Ontario child who does not learn English has been deprived of his birthright. So far as I am concerned my vote will go toward the enforcement of the act. English has got to be the language of this province. All Ontario children must be taught not only to read and write, but to speak and understand English."

**L. AND P. S. R. BOARD WILL
DISCUSS SITES PROPOSITION**

The London and Port Stanley board of directors met last night at 8:30 o'clock, and will discuss Ald. Bennett's proposition to acquire land along the line of the London and Port Stanley road for increased switching accommodation and factory sites. In addition, the board will finally dispose of the request from the residents of Port Stanley to close Smith street and construct another roadway up to Fraser Heights.

Both matters are of much importance to Londoners, and it is expected that some definite solution will be arrived at. "I find that the citizens are much in favor of extending the London and Port Stanley tracks," suggested some time ago," said Ald. Bennett. "I consider it a good proposition, and when a large number of the keenest businessmen have endorsed the idea I am more than ever pleased with it. There is no reason why we cannot do something. London is progressing as rapidly as it should, and it is up to the board to do something."
