To Build \$200,000 Plant to Take Smells Out of Tilbury Product.

SUPERINTENDENT STATES

Frank C. Tomb Says Southern Ontario Company Will Construct It at Port Alma.

The Southern Ontario Gas Company The Southern Ontario Gas Company will install a \$200,000 purifying plant at its fields at Port Alma, Tribury district, to purify all the natural gas to be sold in Western Ontario. This plant, according to the announcement of Frank C. Tomb, superintendent of the company's land department, who was in the city for a few hours yesterday, will be in operation next fall.

"In Woodstock," said Mr. Tomb, "we are putting the gas through the old artificial gas plant purifier, and the result is satisfactory. We are selling, at the present time, in Woodstock, one hundred per cent. more gas than ever before. In Brantford, where such an objection was made to the sulphur odor, we are putting a portion of the gas through the artificial gas purifier, but owing to the large con-sumption, are not able to treat it all in this way. Hamilton is also getting a large share of Tilbury gas, which is being used principally for manufacturing pur-I haven't heard a single kick in hat city.

First of Its Kind
"The purifying plant that we will erect
at the Tilbury fields will be an innovaion in the gas business. It will cost approximately \$200,000, and will be of ample size to cleanse our entire output of the odor to which some people take objection. This is the first time that any gas company has ever attempted to purify its product, but it is being done in consequence of the sentiment in some parts of the district."

More that twenty municipalities of considerable size are being supplied from the Tilbury fields at the present time.

They include Woodstock, Paris, Galt, Hamilton, St. George, Chalam, Blendard, Chalam, Blendard, Chalam, C heim, Ridgetown, Kingsville, Leamingheim, Ridgetown, Kingsville, Leamington, Essex, Windsor, Sandwich, Walkerville, Sarnia and Wallaceburg. In addition, a number of villages and many farms are being supplied.

COPIED C. P. R. PLAN. Recently, Mr. W. A. Prendergast, comp-New · York City, submitted a plan of the proposed system for the distribution of supplies for the city of New York, together with all the necesinformation to carry the system into full operation and effect.

In his report, Mr. Prendergast goes on to state that with these conditions in mind, acting under your instructions, a careful study has been made of some of he most successful systems of centralized purchase through a general purchasing head, and distribution through a general storehouse. 
