"SAYVILLE" HEARS OF BRITISH DEFEAT

Berlin Wireless Tells of Force Being Routed in Africa.

GREAT GAIN; SMALL LOSS

Claims That British Lost 700 and the Germans Only 56.

[Canadian Press.]

April 20.-(By wireless t Sayville).-Among he items given out for publication today by the Overseas News Agency were the following: "Special mail reports from East Africa state that in a two days' battle German troops near Pangani routed a strong force landed from British cruisers and transports. The British lost 700 men, among them four companies captured, besides many rifles and large stores of ammunition. The German casualties were seven officers and thirteen men killed; fourteen officers and

twenty-two men wounded.
"The National Tidende of Copenhagen asserts that German officers in Belgium are discouraged with the results of their administration. It is officially stated, however, that the contrary is true. The military government is supplying Belgian farmers with seed potatoes and oats, with the understanding that the same quantities shall be returned in the fall after
