LEON TROTZKY IN FULL CONFESSION

Bolshevik War Minister Admits Russia Was Ruled by Red Terror.

LONDON, Nov. 3.—Leon Trotsky admits over his own signature that there has been a Red Terror in Russia.

The one-time New York soapbox orator and present head of the Bolshevik army has written a book just issued here by the Labor Publishing Company under the title "The Defence of Terrorism."

Obviously, it is merely a reply to a book by the German Socialist, Karl Kautsky, in which the latter attacks the soviet methods.

Actually, Trotsky's effusion is an arrogant defence of everything the soviets have done.

His common excuse is that the Bolsheviks only did what the aristocratic and bourgeois governments have done and that the soviets were compelled to take the steps they did out of the necessities of their case. Says Trotsky:

Rule With Rifles.

"A revolutionary class which has conquered power with arms in its hands is bound to and will suppress, rifle in hand, all attempts to tear the power out of its hands."

"Where it has against it a hostile army, it will oppose to it its own army. Where it is confronted with armed conspiracy, attempt at murder, uprising, it will hurl at the heads of its enemies an unsparring penalty."

"The question of the form of repression, or of its degree, of course, is not one of principle. It is a question of expediency."

He continues: "War, like revolution, is founded upon intimidation. A victorious war, generally speaking, destroys only an insignificant part of the conquered army, intimidating the remainder and breaking their will."

"The revolution works in the same way. It kills individuals and intimidates thousands. In this sense the Red Terror is not distinguishable from the armed insurrection, the direct continuation of what it represents."

The Distinction.
"The terror of czarism throttled the workers who were fighting for the Socialist order. Our extraordinary commissions shoot landlords, capitalists and generals who are striving to restore the capitalist order. Do you group this distinction? For us Communists it is quite sufficient."

He admits that the soviets have been harsh to the intelligent and professional classes of the community.

In the course of his extraordinarily frank book he admits:

"That the soviet government is a rule of the majority by the minority of determined organized Communists."

"That in another sense it is a dictatorship of the revolutionary city over the country."

That practically all of the opposition newspapers are suppressed.

That the soviets had trouble with the peasants and finally had to array the poorest class of peasants against the more prosperous peasant proprietors.

WOODSTOCK EX-ALDERMAN DIES.
WOODSTOCK, Nov. 3.—John McIlwraith, a well-known local citizen, and an ex-alderman, was found dead in bed this morning. He had been ailing for some time. He was born in Jarvis, Ont., about 60 years ago.

INDIANS OF NORTH LOVE SODA DRINKS

Sit Stolidly in Rows to Watch Colors Flow.

EDMONTON, Alta., Nov. 3.—Young Canadians have nothing on the Indians of the north country when it comes to getting away with red, green, pink and yellow soda water, declares J. A. Morie, a local confectioner, who established the "furthest north" soda fountain at Fort Smith during the past summer. Mr. Morie took in a complete plant for the manufacture of various soft drinks, and the production of these was an unending source of wonder to the aborigines.

The cylinder in which the drinks were made was buried under the

ground, the various liquids being piped to the store, and this enthralling process resulted in the entire Indian population being on hand just so long as the performance lasted. Hour after hour the squaws, children and men would sit in the store and gaze stolidly at the new-fangled apparatus, and every few minutes a round of drinks would be ordered according to color.

In addition to soft drinks, the Indians are "strong" on candies, and for the nonce the natives' diet of straight fish and meat was tempered with the confections of civilization, and they are just as good at eating candies as at drinking "pop," states Mr. Morie.

Like the camel of other cities, the Indians of the north appear to have eight sets of stomachs specially constructed for the containing of liquids, and when Mr. Morie left the north they were still "going strong," with apparently no idea of going out on their trap lines until such times as the total supply of lemonade, ginger pop and candies had disappeared.

MOSCOWANS PAY 2,000 RUBLES A MILE CARFARE

Moscow, Nov. 3.—Only 142 electrical street railway trains of two cars each are in condition to operate in Moscow. Consequently only 22 per cent of the population can be accommodated.

Until a few weeks ago, only Government employees and workers were allowed to use the street railways and had special cards. With the change in the Government's trade policy, the street railways were thrown open to the bourgeoisie from 10 a.m. till 4 p.m., and the fare fixed at 1,000 rubles a "stretch," which is about half a mile.

The fares collected average about 1,500,000,000 rubles a month, and the monthly deficit on the street railways is 2,000,000,000 rubles.
