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## GREER SPEAKS ON SCHOOL ACT

**Local Inspector Outlines Enforcement of Adolescent Measure.**

**Claims Innovation in Education Will Replace Apprenticeships.**

Explaining the working-out and method of enforcement of the adolescent act before the London Chamber of Commerce at noon Wednesday, Public School Inspector V. K. Greer advanced the statement that the effect of the act on the next generation of industrial workers and professionals would be a greatly increased measure of efficiency and success.

"The act of the success of industry of the present day is due to the new out-of-date system of apprenticeship," Inspector Greer said. "And the adolescent act effectively enforced, with vocational guidance as one of its departments, will take the place of apprenticeship, and fit the rising generation to the work they have chosen, making them square pegs in square holes."

The inspector referred to adolescents who leave school at an early age, keeping the first position which offers itself, only to find another with greater financial returns is available.

"That system has meant jumping around from one place to another with no definite object except money, and a gradual settling down in the ranks of the misfits."

To the question, Ontario going too far in the enforcement of such a law, the inspector replied:

"Less Than 90." "Of the 1,817 adolescents in London of the ages of 14 and 15 and not yet 16, less than 90 have been accounted for. There are 583 in full-time attendance in the public schools, 433 at the Central Collegiate Institute, 440 at the Technical School, 145 at the Southern Collegiate Institute, 19 at the Victoria Continuation School, and 150 at other schools and business colleges."

"If you, as employers, have felt no effects of the adolescent act up to the present time, there is little or no danger in the capital of Ontario to feel any effects at a future date. The aim of those who are responsible for the enforcement of the act is to meet the employer on a fair basis as possible, with as little inconvenience as possible, and make sufficient concessions to see that the spirit of the act is put into force."

**Have Third Grade Standing.** With regard to those who were now taking the part time courses, Mr. Greer said they were for the most part school with only a third grade standing.

"Anything less than a junior high school entrance is a manifestly inadequate basis upon which to face the competition offered in every branch of modern trade and industry," he said, "and furthermore, in addition to seeing that everyone has at least an entrance standing, the adolescent act will take care of students between the ages of 12 and 18, just the age, when they are started on the right road to industry and success, or settled into the ways of drifters and misfits."

To the question of why night classes were not counted as part time education, Inspector Greer stated that he considered the reason for such might be that after working all day, students were not in fit condition for study at night.

**Justice Lectures Prisoner on Callousness Shown at Trial in Chatham.**

Chatham, Sept. 20.—After the jury brought in a verdict of manslaughter at 2:10 this morning, Justice Lennox sentenced Clayton Croft to life imprisonment for the murder of a woman on a charge of forgery to which Croft pleaded guilty. His lordship imposed a sentence of 10 years.

Justice Lennox, in sentencing Croft, said: "The jury finds you only guilty of manslaughter. I have seen no greater exhibition of callousness than you have exhibited here during my term on the bench. I find no mitigating circumstances. You are a young man of intelligence. You are a man of property. There is no doubt in my mind that you planned the crime, and I must impose a sentence of imprisonment for your natural and just punishment."

The prisoner took the verdict with eyes flashing defiance at the judge. Only a few minutes before he had been reading a newspaper while awaiting the return of the jury.

**CHIEF WILL REFUSE TO ALLOW BULLFIGHT HERE**

Can See No Possibility of Promoters' Success When Cockfights Are Not Allowed.

Coming as he does from the land of the heather, where they pick up quarrels with their cattle, Chief of Police William Birrell displayed no enthusiasm when told that a Spanish matador had offered to fight an English bull for the benefit of the peaceful citizens of London.

Even the guarantee of \$250,000 enough to assure him his salary for two full years, failed to stir him. In fact, the chief threatens to put his foot down on it, thereby putting an end to all possibilities, the bull fight.

"It is absurd, as well as being against the law," he said. "I won't let the thing get started, even."

"It is bad enough that nature allows two animals of the same species a desire to fight without a man seeking to fight a bull for money. It is too disgusting for words."

Inspector Greer answered with a very definite negative. "When the subject of university education was first broached years ago," he said, "the cry was raised that the nation was overpopulated, and the labor markets exhausted. That argument has long since been futile. In further proof, we have only to look at the effectiveness of adolescent acts in the various parts of the United States."

With reference to the cost of putting the act in force, Inspector Greer showed that the increased cost of education in London was not due to the adolescent act, but to the number of students in voluntary attendance. "Since 1912, and previous to the enforcement of the adolescent act, I thoroughly believe that London had a higher percentage of adolescent attendance than any other city in the province," he said.

**EXPECT ANGLO-FRENCH PACT**

Italian representative, prior to the opening of the allied conference at 3:30 o'clock this afternoon, at which the French, British and Italian representatives were to be assisted by various experts of whom Admiral Earl Beatty is one.

**TO LAUNCH AN ATTACK.** Constantino, Sept. 20.—Official formation that Mustafa Kemal Pasha is preparing to launch an attack for the possession of the Dardanelles in spite of the exhortations of General Pele. French high commissioner, is causing undisguised anxiety in allied military circles in the capital.

It is not improbable that such an attack will be made before the end of the present week, it is stated, the Turks taking advantage of the fact that the British have not yet concentrated all their forces.

**To Hold Straits.** The British, however, are declared to be determined to hold the straits at all costs, regardless of how formidable the Kemalists forces may be, and regardless also of whether France and Italy participate in the defence.

One of the best evidences of the British determination to resist the subjects, including the great British officers, are leaving the city, showing that they believe the fighting imminent.

It is understood here that the French cabinet warned the Angora government of the inadvisability of an attack on the neutral zone, but the Nationalists have refused to be deterred by the proposed attack in the nature of a defensive and protective movement in view of Great Britain's military preparations in support of their alleged policy of depriving Turkey of Thrace.

**In Demolition.** The Kemalists are in dangerous proximity to the neutral zone, and a forward movement on their part will meet with stern opposition from the British. The British position would be greatly strengthened if the military and naval units promised from England and the dominions were near at hand.

The Turkish Nationalist assembly at Angora, by an overwhelming majority, has extended the dictatorship of Mustafa Kemal Pasha, and has authorized him to continue the war until all the conditions prescribed in the national pact have been fully achieved.

**RUSSIA WILL NOT FIGHT.** Moscow, Sept. 20.—Russia intends to support the Turks morally, and perhaps give them munitions, if they should be needed; but it is considered in Moscow as extremely unlikely that Russian troops will be sent to assist the Kemalists if they attempt to take Constantinople. While preferring the Turks to the Allies as the holders or Constantinople, nevertheless it is understood the Russian staff might bring them into a real war with Great Britain. The Russian staff might give aid, either from a distance or on the ground, but no troops will be sent, it is here.

Russia for a long time has made no secret that it was aiding the Kemalists to the utmost, and it is asserted that if Constantinople actually appeared about to fall into the hands of the Turks the Russians would make every effort to prevent it, except by dispatching a red army to the fighting line.

Some of the Russian leaders declare Constantinople should be Russian, and they are of the opinion that Constantinople Turkish, but strongly influenced from Moscow.

Nevertheless, all Russia is tired of war, and the leaders are pledged to the task of reconstruction of the country, which they do not desire to be hindered by new international strife.
