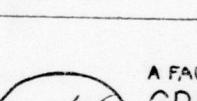
Blenheim, in the 14th, Adkin reached third, and a few moments later an overthrown to second scored him, giving the locals the third and winning run.

What are the commonest faults of the average golfer?

A faulty grip and a poor stance are the commonest faults of the average golfer. The effects of these are numerous—topping, slicing, pulling, and smothering. Shots. Then again, if the grip is not held properly, a faulty backswing will naturally follow. If the stance is not firm and correct in relation to the ball, a good balance cannot be maintained throughout the swing.

My advice to the average golfer is to get a grip which is suitable and at the same time comfortable. Also cultivate a good wide, firm stance, and you will be on the right road to correct a great many faults.
