SAY ALBERTA COAL **GOOD SUBSTITUTE** FOR U. S. PRODUCT

Government Committee Issues Satisfactory Report on Investigations.

FREE FROM CLINKERS

Found. While Fuel Very Hot, Did Not Last So Long as Anthracite.

Canadian Press Despatch. Toronto, Ont., May 17 .- The committee appointed by the Ontario government to try out Alberta coal reported this morning that the best The London boy who tied with D. Martin, of Hamilton, for the \$400 be a satisfactory substitute for Unibe a satisfactory substitute for United States hard coal. The committee was J. A. Ellis, fuel controller, C. H. Mitchell of the University of Toronto, and R. P. Fairburn, deputy minister of public works.

The committee states that it would be desirable if there was importation that only the best grades be brought. n. Importation in the minds of the ommittee would not be satisfactory inless Alberta coal could be delivered in Toronto at \$12.50 a ton as compared with \$15.50 for United States anthracite. A ton of Alberta coal will not last as long as the anthracite and it takes 1¼ or 1½ tons to equal a ton of hard coal.

The tests in private houses showed that there was little smoke and that no good coal was found in the ashes and with a few exceptions there was no clinkers or slate. It was agreed by all who tested that the coal gave immense heat and responded quickly to draft. It must be remembered, however, states the report, that the coal was used in comparatively mild weather. About the only difficulty reported was that some had trouble in keeping the fire low until the draft, was properly regulated.
