

POLICY OF LABOR GOVT. IN EVICTION BILL DENOUNCED

David Kirkwood Declares He Will Remedy Evil and Risk Prison Term.

SOLID OPPOSITION

London, April 5.—Speaking at Glasgow yesterday, the minister of health, John Wheatley, said that if the country had really been startled by such proposals as were contained in the rent evictions bill, "God help their tranquility in the days to come," for when a Labor majority appeared in the House of Commons it would alter the whole social question.

A little earlier, in the House of Commons, David Kirkwood, another Clyde-side champion, protesting against the policy of the government regarding the evictions bill, declared the country might as well have the Tories in power as the present Labor government, which had done nothing to end the evictions of men who could not get employment with which to pay their rent. He added that if the government refused to act he would go to his constituency and put the evicted tenants back into their home, defying the law, even if it landed him in prison.

Mr. Kirkwood seems to be between Scylla and Charybdis on this question. Pushed hard on the one hand by the Glasgow men and others of the Labor left wing, they are on the other encountering solid opposition from the Liberals and Conservatives, who declare they will have nothing to do with the ministerial plans as thus revealed.

The Liberal press today is as emphatic as the Conservative in this regard. The Daily News, for instance, charging that the government in protecting the tenant is robbing the landlord, and "foundering in a mess of mud and make-believe."

Members discussing the bill in the lobbies last night professed sympathy with those evicted. With the exception of the Laborites, however, they were skeptical of the government's ability to remove the difficulties, and contended that it would have to frame an entirely new scheme.

Yesterday In Ontario's Legislature

Toronto, March 5.—Premier Ferguson introduced bill to amalgamate all the power interests of the hydro-electric at Niagara.

Hon. W. F. Nickle introduced bill putting inoperative the insurance companies under provincial secretary. The bill, however, retains the administration of the insurance act.

K. OF C. BOARD GATHERS FOR QUARTERLY SESSION

Directors For Whole Continent Meet For Second Time Since Society's Founding.

Montreal, April 5.—For the second time since the organization of the Knights of Columbus, the board of directors for the whole continent, comprising seven supreme officers and fifteen supreme directors of the order, gathered here today for their quarterly meeting. On Sunday the supreme officers and directors will tender a banquet to His Excellency Monsignor Pietro di Maria, apostolic delegate to Canada.

A report will be presented by the committee in charge of the organization of the junior organization, to be known as Columbus Squares.

Rev. G. T. Daly, Toronto, is expected to address the board today on immigration problems.

City police are investigating the theft of a shoeshine stand, valued at \$200, which had been placed at the rear of the Chatham Billiard Academy while alterations were being carried out.

Auditor Named.

W. R. London, city auditor, was appointed by the Chatham Public Utilities Commission at the regular monthly meeting held today.

Will Enter Protest.

A delegation of the Kent County Council is seeking an appointment with Premier Ferguson and Hon. Charles McGee, minister of mines, on Tuesday morning next, to voice a protest against the proposed new gas legislation. Members of the delegation are the Reeves of nine Kent townships interested in the natural gas problem.

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ROAD EXPENDITURE ESTIMATE REVISED

Kent Council Increases the Amount Recommended by Committee.

Chatham, April 4.—The Kent County Council, at its closing session today, adopted its road program for the year, increasing the estimates of various road expenditures, as recommended by the road committee, by \$34,000.

The council decided to call for a total expenditure of \$152,302, of which the county would have to raise \$85,486 by levy. The increased work means the expenditure by the county of approximately \$13,000 more. The rate to be struck for road purposes will be approximately 10 cents per acre.

The council decided to macadamize about half of the Chatham-Wallaceburg road. The Chatham Suburban Road Commission will similarly improve another mile. The report of the road committee did not recommend any permanent work on this road. The council decided to macadamize two miles of a four mile "missing link" near Wabash.

Again Remanded.

Three clerks, employees of the Standard Bank, arrested three weeks ago on charges of stealing funds of the bank, were again remanded for one week, when taken before Magistrate Arnold in city police court today.

The defendants are William Echin, Wilbert Holden and Richard Heddle. The original charges preferred against them alleged theft of \$20,000. Three specific charges have since been preferred against Heddle and Echin and one against Holden.

Offices Shifted.

In future, county police court proceedings cannot be held in Harrison Hall. They will be held either at city police headquarters or the Kent county jail. A recommendation to this effect by the Harrison Hall committee was adopted by the Kent County Council today, because of a change in location of city and county offices in the building. High Constable Peters' department will be located on the top floor. City Manager Fuller will occupy the quarters formerly occupied by the high constable, while County Engineer Coffey will occupy the offices formerly held by the city manager.
