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ANTIS HOLD THE FLOOR

Enemies of Reciprocity Severely
Arraign Bill in Senate.

Senator Cummins Opens the Ball With
an Attack on the Measure as an
Injustice to the Farmer—Legislators
Pay Little Attention to the
Discussion—Nelson of Minnesota
Suggests Recess Until the Fall.

Washington, June 29.—Yesterday was a day of bitter arraignment of the Canadian reciprocity bill in the Senate. Beginning with Senator Cummins' attack on the measure as legislation unjust to the agricultural interests of the country, and concluding with Senator Borah's denunciation of the bill as Republican betrayal of the farming interests, the debate was all antagonistic to the agreement and critical of the President and his methods.

The Senate gave but partial attention to the speeches, although they were among the most important that will be made against the bill. Several times a call of the Senate was demanded. Senator Nelson of Minnesota finally proposed that as so little attention was given to the subject the Senate take a recess until November or December.

Senator Cummins, who will continue his speech today, attacked not only the construction of the reciprocity agreement itself, which he said put the whole burden of free trade upon the farmer without giving him any benefits in the way of reduction of duty on manufactured products, but he criticized also the power exercised by the President to negotiate and to bring it to the point of a definite agreement between the two countries.

"I know that the day has come for the farmer," declared Senator Cummins, "the day in which he is to be excluded from the benefits of the protective tariff. The device has been written; it needs only the official signature for the time to begin to exclude him from the company of the manufacturer of the United States. Senator Borah's criticism was placed on the record of the Republican party as the advocate of protection for the farmer. He quoted at length from Republican platforms, campaign documents, campaign arguments and definitions of policy to show that the abolishment of the protection on farm products was a reversal of all Republican policy.

Senator Borah said both political parties were now striving for the vote of the cities and the support of the press. The administration now in control," said Senator Borah, "has no power on a pledge to protect the American market for the American farmer. The time was when the farmer was not disputed within this chamber, that such legislation as this was destructive of his prosperity. Then every Republican in the Senate was his attorney. Now, because he calls in a New York attorney to present his case before the finance committee, he is accused of being the friend and companion of the trusts and big interests."

New French Cabinet.

Paris, June 29.—The new French Cabinet is definitely constituted, and Joseph Caillaux, the Premier, who succeeds M. Monis, presented his colleagues to President Faillieres, who signed the nomination decrees. The Cabinet is composed as follows:

M. Caillaux, Premier and Minister of the Interior; Jean Cruppi, Justice; Justin G. DeSevelles, foreign affairs; L. L. Klotz, finance; Adolphe Messmy, War; Theophile Delcasse, marine; Jules Steeg, public instruction; M. Augagneur, public works; M. Couyba, commerce; Jules Pams, agriculture; M. Lebrun, colonies; Rene Renoult, labor.

Under Secretaries: Interior, M. Talvy; finance, M. Bismard; fine arts, M. Dujardin-Beaumetz; posts, M. Chaumet.

She Used "An Axe."

Ottawa, June 29.—According to Magistrate O'Keefe yesterday, Mrs. A. Paquette was quite justified in using the axe on her husband last week to defend herself, but he did not believe in using an axe unless in extreme cases. The magistrate let the accused go on suspended sentence. He warned her that an axe was a formidable weapon to use except in cases of extreme emergency. The bench, however, considered that the prisoner was goaded to use the axe and had done so without intent to kill.

Paquette, arranged on a charge of drunkenness, was also released, in view of his punishment with the axe.

Serious Runaway.

Chatham, June 29.—While driving to Rutherford to deliver a carload of steers, Malcolm McDiarmid, an aged and well-known Dawn farmer, met with a serious runaway accident. His horse became frightened at a dog and bolted. Mr. McDiarmid was thrown from his rig and sustained a number of serious injuries. He was badly shaken up and bruised, and his hand and fingers were broken. The buggy was also badly demolished.

Gave Employees a Social.

Chatham, June 29.—The Canadian Wolverine Co., Ltd., gave a complimentary social for their employees on the factory grounds in Chatham North on Tuesday evening. Speeches were given by a number of the influential men of the city, and a large crowd was in attendance. The company intend to give a series of these socials during the summer months.

After License Reduction.

Kingston, June 29.—Citizens League are at work endeavoring to secure another reduction in the number of liquor licenses. Petitions are being sent out to ratepayers, asking them to sign for further reduction. The league succeeded in having three licenses cut off two years ago.


