MEMORANDUM FOR THE HONORABLE
MEMBERS OF THE HOUSE OF COMMONS
ON THE SUBJECT OF THE
RECENT BRITISH POLICY IN REGARD TO
THE DOMINION OF CANADA

Great Britain has not asked to consent to the Federal Union of the British Empire, but she has asked to consent to the Dominion of Canada.

The world does not know of anything more interesting, and at the same time more bizarre than the following:

THE PROBLEM.

THE ANSWER.
New York, Sept. 29.—I deem it my duty to say that information from Washington reaches me of a reliable character to the effect that the Senate Committee of Foreign Affairs has, during the past few days, furtherance of the views of its chairman, Senator Sherman, been discussing the question of admitting the Dominion of Canada to join the United States.

So far matters progressed that it is not at all unlikely that a resolution will be reported for concurrent action of both Houses, declaring it to be the duty of the President to open negotiations with Great Britain looking to a political union between the English-speaking nations on this continent.

The condition attending the invitation of Canada is understood to be that the United States would assume the entire public debt of the Dominion, estimated at \$300,000,000.

Commercial Union was urged as the basis of the proposed negotiation, on the ground that while a large majority might be secured in favor of a political union, a smaller majority would be secured in favor of a commercial union, but the sentiment of the committee was strongly in favor of proposing a first Political Union that it was impossible to contend with it. Has Interviewed.
New York, Sept. 30.—There are 1,000,000 Canadians in the United States, and the only way to get them out of the Dominion is to give them a commercial union with Great Britain.

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THE CITY'S SANITATION

THE LATEST REPORT OF TORONTO'S
INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

Thirty-seven Cases occurred During Last Week—Increase of Two over the Preceding Week—Dr. Bryce on Sanitation.

The World expects to see that the health of the Dominion of Canada is in a state of sanitary peril. The Medical Officer of Health reports an increase in the number of cases of infectious diseases in the Dominion of Canada.

A week ago there were ten cases of typhoid fever, two of scarlet fever, 14 of typhoid fever, two of smallpox. Since this outbreak there have occurred 37 cases, of which 19 are typhoid fever, 10 of scarlet fever, and four of typhoid fever. The greatest increase is in typhoid fever, which one patient has died.
