SUCCSSFUL RURAL DEANERY MEETING IN KERWOOD

The Spring meeting of the Rural Deanery of West Middlesex and of the Deanery Woman's Auxiliary was held in St. Paul's church, Kerwood, on Wednesday, June 10th. There was a good atendance from most of the parishes in the deanery. Communion service was held at 9.30 a.m., conducted by the rector, Rev. H. R. Diehl, assisted by the Rev. H. R. 
