Dr. Reginald Stephen Boehner, of Syracuse university and Margaret Huntington Watkeys, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frederick D. Watkeys, of 48 Dietz street, this city, were married at 9:30 o'clock yesterday morning at the First Presbyterian Church parsonage, the Rev. Dr. J. C. Russell officiating. The wedding was a quiet one, only members of the families and a few intimate friends being present. Mr. and Mrs. Paul Watkeys and their daughter, Miss Dorothy, Mr. Watkeys being a brother of the bride, were the only attendants of the couple. Following the ceremony Dr. and Mrs. Boehner left for Syracuse, where a furnished apartment awaits them.

The bride is a member of one of the city's best known and most respected families and is a young lady of rare personality and of exceptional talents, her ability in the field of painting and decorative art being widely recognized in the city. Following a course at the Oneonta High School she entered the College of Fine Arts at Syracuse university, where she graduated therefrom in 1917 with highest honors, having won several prizes for work in painting and decorating. Following the completion of a post graduate course in the department of painting she accepted a position as an instructor in that department, which position she will continue to occupy. A brilliant student and an artist of proven ability, she has a bright future ahead of her. Practically a life long resident of Oneonta, she has many friends here who will wish her only the best of good fortune.

Dr. Boehner is a native of Nova Scotia and a graduate of Dalhousie College at Halifax. Following a post graduate course at McGill University and two years special study in his chosen field of chemistry in Berlin, Germany, Dr. Boehner became professor of organic chemistry at Syracuse and is recognized as one of the most brilliant and popular members of the faculty of that university. HARBINGER IS STILL HAVING DIFFICULTIES

Until another Canadian captain arrives to take command of the freight steamer Harbinger, she will be unable to leave Eastport to resume the long voyage to Nassau, Bahamas, with her valuable cargo of liquors taken on board at St. John on December 30th. There have been many causes for delays since the rum-carrying steamer put into Eastport on January 1st for a supply of water. The expenses of two guards, day and night, for more than a week, as also other expenses during her delay, will have to be paid by someone, and it was said in Eastport that the government was responsible for expenses up to last Friday afternoon, when the craft had been legally released. To complicate matters for the departure of the craft, one of her crew was locked up to await further identification by the officers in charge of the case under investigation.

ARTHUR S. SOULIS DIES IN WINNIPEG

Was For Many Years Prominent In Halifax As Pioneer In Hydro-Electric Development.

The death occurred at Winnipeg Monday night of Mr. Arthur Edward Soulis, former well-known business man of Halifax and a pioneer in this vicinity of hydro-electric power development. The first knowledge his son, Mr. Paul O. Soulis, president and general manager of the Soulis Typewriter Co., Ltd., here, had of his father's illness was on Sunday, when he received a wire to the effect that his father had been operated on the previous night and his condition was serious. Monday there came word that the physician in attendance gave no hope of recovery, and at midnight the announcement came that Mr. Soulis had passed away during the evening.

Mr. Soulis was a native of Smith's Cove, Digby County. Early in life he went in the piano and organ business, and it was he who organized the Acadia Organ Co., at Bridgetown, N.S., and many of their make of instruments may still be found throughout the province. He spent a year in Annapolis and fourteen years in Bridgetown and then came to Halifax, where he was for years with Miller Bros., and later with the late W. H. Johnson. Eighteen years ago he went to Winnipeg where he opened the piano and organ business of Soulis & Co., and later had been engaged in insurance.

Though engaged in the musical instrument business, Mr. Soulis gave very much attention to the matter of hydro electric power development, and while in Halifax, the Bedford Electric Co., promoted by him, was incorporated with a capital of \$3,000,000, for the purpose of developing the watershed power which the Halifax Power Co. and the government power commission have since developed. There were twenty-one lakes and streams included in the watershed Mr. Soulis had in view, among them being those taken in hand by the Power Commission, and much of the property was bonded. Water power at Birch Cove and at Mel's Mills were also included in the plan with a view of a tramway line around the Basin from Halifax to Dartmouth. The hope was to make lands about the Basin shores the elite residential district of the city. Mr. Soulis was therefore the pioneer in attempted development of hydro electric power here. His plan had in view also the possibility of a tramway from Halifax to Lunenburg. He is credited with being the one to introduce electric light in the province outside of Halifax City for public use, and when he came to Halifax sold the patent he had then in operation at Bridgetown. In a letter received from him last year, he wrote that he followed the power development situation here closely in the Halifax papers, and he was pleased to find the estimates of the Commission engineers agreed with the estimates he had had from his New York engineer when he had the plan under consideration.
