### BRIDE HOUSE AND BARNS

In Midland Blaze Exceeded  
\$10,000—Church Saved With  
Difficulty.

The occupied house (originally  
Nicholas Curry property) and  
empty barns owned by the J. B.  
Company were destroyed by fire  
Sunday night and the loss is over  
\$10,000. The residence, which was

formerly the home of Mr. Wack, man-  
ager of the J. B. King Company, well  
known plaster firm, had not been oc-  
cupied for two years. The fire was  
discovered by Rev. W. I. Croft, pastor  
of the Methodist Church, who lives  
opposite, and the local bucket brig-  
ade did good work in confining the  
flames to the residence and barns.  
The Methodist Church, which is next  
to the King property, was in grave  
danger of being destroyed by the  
fire.—Hants Journal.

**COTTON QITS AS 'RED' EDITOR**  
Glouce Bay.—W. U. Cotton, B. C. L.,  
who, since October, 1921, has been  
editor of the Maritime Labor Herald,  
announced on Tuesday morning that  
he had severed his connection with  
that journal.

Mr. Cotton further announces that  
Tom Bell, of the Workers' Party, Tor-  
onto, who recently assumed the posi-  
tion of business manager of the  
Herald, will also become editor and  
manage the journal on a dual capacity.

On the part of Mr. Cotton's re-  
signment as editor of the Herald  
was a distinct surprise.

He has been in charge of the  
Maritime Herald since it was organ-  
ized late in the Fall of 1921, and has  
become one of the recognized leaders  
of the radical labor element in dis-  
trict 26.

Some months ago street rumour had  
it that Mr. Cotton would retire from  
the editor's chair, but he continued  
to dispense editorials which varied  
from eulogies of the "ideal" form of  
government in Russia to the alleged  
rottenness of the British Empire.

Steel Corporation and all its works.  
He is an avowed radical and an  
apostle of the Soviet form of govern-  
ment, declaring many times through  
the Herald that the only salvation for  
the workers here is in the establish-  
ment of dictatorship of the proletariat  
in Canada.

Mr. Bell, who succeeds Mr. Cotton,

ably since she gave her last recital,  
in breadth, style, and fullness of tone.  
Her best numbers were heard in the  
second group—two love songs by  
Liszt, and the Finale from the "Fa-  
ching-schwank" by Schumann. The  
beautiful "Cantique d'amour" by Liszt,  
she also excellently rendered. This  
is one of the more contemplative and  
deeply felt Liszt compositions, and  
Miss Whitman brought out the noble  
melody, with refined feeling. Here  
she made no attempt to force her  
tone from the piano, but the gradua-  
tion and modulation throughout was  
very fine. Abundant power and well  
equipped octave technic dominated  
her playing of the sixth Rhapsody by  
Liszt. The ease with which Miss  
Whitman conquers the technical diffi-  
culties looks very like indifference,  
but is in reality complete repose and  
matured work. The octave passage  
work in the middle and at the close  
of the lurid composition was taken  
with rousing brilliancy.

Miss Poole, who assisted Miss Whit-  
man, has a sweet soprano voice. She  
made a good impression by her artistic  
realization of the songs she sang  
so well, and which were so suited  
to her voice.

Miss Page, of the Oratory depart-  
ment, added greatly to the success of  
the recital by contributing to the pro-  
gram. Her reading was followed  
closely by an attentive and apprecia-  
tive audience.

Miss Bessie Bell, who accompanied  
Miss Poole, proved herself to be a  
sympathetic and capable accompan-  
ist.
