GRÆCO-ROMAN WRESTLING MATCH AT MONTREAL.

DoBar's Opera House, Montreal, was pretty well filled on the evening of the 27th, on the occasion of the wrestling match between Treher and Heygster, surnamed the "Oak of the Rhine." The stakes were a purse of \$1,000, if the advertisement is to be depended upon, and possibly the money may have been put up; if so, the winner of the match should be congratulated on having carned it without much trouble. The exhibition is scarcely worthy of a serious description, so little in earnest did the men appear to be; nevertheless, for the information of bition is scarcesy worthy of a serious description, so little in earnest did the men appear to be; neverthelees, for the information of the curious, we may say that Treher, the Champion of Gaul, is, in comparison with his antagonist, a mere pigmy, being scarcely more than half the weight of the Teuton, as the following figures will show: Teher—height, 5 feet 61 inches; weight, 196 lbs; chest, 44 inches; waist, 40 inches. hips, 28 inches; alf, 17 inches. Heygster—height, 5 feet 7 inches; weight, 804 lbs; chest, 58 inches; waist, 54 inches; hips, 32 inches; calf, 22 inches. The first round lasted 10 mutes, and was won by Treher, who, after being tossed, regained his feet and pinned the German's shoulders to the ground. Heygster won the second round in 3m., having, after a little sparring, got a back hold on the little Frenchman. In the third round Heygster threw Treher three times, and, after a roll over on the ground, won this round also Time 51 m. The fourth round was rather more lively than the others, both men were being tossed and rolling over without any definite result until Treher got the Teuton's shoulders flat on the boards. Time, 11 m. The fifth and last round was taken by the Fr. nchman, in 6m., who was declared the winner of the match. Heygster then announced that he would challenge Treher to another trial of skill.

Whestling Match. — Another wrestling match has been arranged between J. H. McLaughlin of Detroit, and Jacob H. Martin of Ypsi'anti, Mich. The conditions are collar and elbow, best two in three back falls, for \$1,000. These men have met twice before, but neither of the contests were decided. Both men are without equals in the wrest-ling arena. McLaughlin has never been de-teated, with one exception. He defeated his conqueror, Hom-r Lane, four times after-ward. They are both powerful men. Mc-Laughlin weighs 258 pounds, Martin weighs 259 pounds, and is 6 feet 2 inches in height.
