- In an editorial addressed to university students, the People's Daily noted that all students would be required to study documents related to the "period of unrest" to help them "understand reality and clarify the facts."
- The government of Shanzi Province confiscated 2700 limousines bought illegally. The cars were registered in the names of private households or army units. (Xinhua)
- Production of 7 of 12 major textile products including cotton cloth, woollen fabrics and silk, did not meet targets set for the Jan-July period. Fifteen provinces, municipalities and autonomous regions need cotton urgently and if the problem persists, the supply of cotton products to domestic and foreign markets will be affected.
- The Chinese Youth News reported that a Chinese student, who allegedly spoke to the Voice of America radio network about the democracy movement, was sentenced to nine years in prison.

TAIWAN

- The International Trade Commission ruled that Taiwanese exports of martial arts clothing are not being dumped on the US market.

HONG KONG

- The US House of Representatives is considering a bill to double the annual number of immigrants from HK from 5000 to 10,000.
- The Hong Kong Convention and Exhibition Centre will ban future immigration exhibitions as they are "detrimental to HK's image."
- US Congressman John Porter is expected to introduce a resolution calling on Britain to convene an international conference on Hong Kong.
- HK Police fought with hundreds of Vietnamese refugees at the Tai Ah Chan detention centre.

KOREA/COREE

- The demand for power continues to surge with peak loads up 10% in 1989 and projected 7.8% next year.

- The ROK will establish an econo-mic cooperation fund to promote economic and technical cooperation with the ASEAN countries.
- The ROK and Japan will hold a shipping conference to negotiate the establishment of new routes using high-speed ships between the two countries.

INDOCHINA/INDOCHINE

- The International Conference on Cambodia, held in Paris, has ended without a settlement of the Cambodia problem.
