HIGH RATE OF BANKRUPTCY IN SMALL BUSINESS—MOTION UNDER S.O. 43

Mr. Otto Jelinek (High Park-Humber Valley): Mr. Speaker, if the high-flying Minister of Industry, Trade and Commerce (Mr. Horner) would cool down for a moment, I would like to raise a matter of urgent and pressing necessity under Standing Order 43.

In view of the fact that exuberant bank rate increases will further adversely influence the record-breaking number of bankruptcies within the small business sector, resulting from costly and inadequate financing, and because a recent survey indicates that more than 95 per cent of small businessmen applying for a loan under the Small Businesses Loans Act were turned down due to a lack of government initiative in promoting the program, along with a lack of co-operation by the chartered banks themselves, I move, seconded by the hon. member for Ottawa Centre (Mr. de Cotret):

That this House instruct the Minister of Finance to encourage chartered banks to co-operate fully under the provisions of the Small Businesses Loans Act, and at the same time enhance and promote the act by amending it to include venture capital loans at preferential rates for the small businessman.
