obtained. After the soldiers defending the presidential palace surrendered their arms to the invaders, the latter slaughtered them like sheep and mutilated their bodies. Then the Syrian army initiated a massacre of those in the vicinity.

### [Translation]

Mr. Speaker, on many occasions in this House I have condemned the foreign armies on Lebanese soil, in a Lebanon that was one of the signatories to the United Nations Charter in 1945. We have asked the international community, in every way possible, to oblige both foreign armies to leave Lebanese territory.

Mr. Speaker, what does it take to persuade all Canadians to put pressure on the Canadian government to persuade the UN Security Council to end the massacre of a people?

### **EXTRADITION ACT**

Mr. Doug Fee (Red Deer): Mr. Speaker, tens of thousands of Canadians have demanded changes to the Extradition Act. Frankly, I am embarrassed that we have such a prolonged procedure, one that allows foreign fugitives to languish in Canadian custody at Canadian expense rather than face justice in their own country.

The hon. member for Peterborough presented a bill to this House on Tuesday that would reduce the extradition proceedings by up to one and a half years. The Official Opposition and the government had agreed to expedite the bill and move it to committee for action.

We had the opportunity to vote with all-party agreement. For purely partisan reasons, the New Democrats refused to agree and have delayed that vote. We had the means to improve the Extradition Act but the New Democratic Party delayed these improvements. The Canadian public has demanded them and we are going to see this act improved in spite of the NDP.
